That it is expedient in the national interest that the applicant should, instead of being employed in military service, be engaged otherwise. engeged otherwise. (b) That he has one or two broth-

ers and one of them is serving, or has served, in His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces dur ing the present war. That he has three or more brothers and two of them are serv-

ing or have served in His Ma-jesty's Naval or Military Forces (d) That he has persons mainly dependent upon him for support,

such as parents, brothers or (e) Ill health or infirmity.

EXEMPTION APPLICATIONS may be made to the Tribunal in St. John's through the Registrar and outside St. John's direct to the Commissioners (magistrates) appointed by the Tribunal.
