

Even then the offal is not finished with. The residue becomes guano, which is dried out and shipped to California, where it realizes a good price on account of its value as a fertilizer of fruit trees.



Gold From the Floor. At one time the great fish-canning concerns of the Frozen River simply turned the hose on the floors and washed the offal into the river. Then brain-wave seized one man. There must be quantities of oil in that offal.
