These resolutions are as follows:-1. The Governor in Council shall have power, by proclamation published in the Royal Gazette, upon the petition of the residents of any town or settlement in the Colony, to impose tax to be paid in respect of all coal imported into the said town or settle ment; and to fix or alter the amount of the said tax from time to time.

2. The said tax shall be collected by the Sub-Collector of Customs from the persons importing the said coal and shall be paid by him to the Road Board having jurisdiction over the area in which such town or settlement is situated; and shall be expended and used by the Board for the purpose of lighting the streets of such town or settlement.

3. The said tax shall be in lieu of all Custom duties payable in respect of such coal under the Customs Act, but that Act shall not in any other respect be affected.
