

Balkan Dispute Referred to League of Nations.

English Industries Re-Commencing--London Unemployed Besiege Board of Guardians--Sinn Fein M.P. to Speak at Armagh.

WORK FOR THE LEAGUE.

GENEVA, Sept. 2. The Council of the League of Nations today decided to refer the entire dispute between Albania, Greece and Yugoslavia to the Assembly of the League for settlement.

CLOUDS DISPERSING.

LONDON, Sept. 2. Further signs of the revival of industry in Great Britain are apparent. Palmer's steel works at Jarrow, which have been closed down since the first week of the recent stoppage of work in the coal mines, will re-open next Monday. In Cleveland District two new works, which have been idle since last March, will also start up again early. This will involve the opening of the Ironstone mine at Ayrton.

THE POPLAR DISORDERS.

LONDON, Sept. 2. London's unemployed, to hold their own as the news feature of the day, following the sensational denunciations of last night, involving the arrest and imprisonment of several members of the Poplar Borough Council, and the more or less peaceable, but determined, all night siege of the Guardians at Woolwich by those demanding heavy unemployment maintenance. Nine members of the Poplar Council, including the Mayor, spent their first night behind the bars for refusing to comply with the London County Council demands for levying further taxes on the town, it being maintained by the Poplar Council that the unemployment situation rendered further assessment impossible. Last evening ten thousand unemployed marched to the offices of the Board of Guardians, and demanded greater necessary relief. The Guardians declined to acquiesce, whereupon the unemployed deputations barred the doors and refused to allow the Guardians to enter their homes, until their demands were granted. It was six o'clock this morning before both sides, weary and hungry, called truce, and the doors were unbarred. Three more councillors had been arrested by one o'clock this afternoon, and a near riot developed as the Sheriff's officers were taking two of them.

LABOR AND DISARMAMENT. GENEVA, Sept. 2. Leon Jouhaux, President of the French General Federation of Labor, who represents labor on the Disarmament Commission of the League of Nations, has presented resolutions for a special International Conference on Disarmament, at which all countries and classes, including labor would be represented. He also asks that supervision of the League over armaments be extended to private manufacture.

VISITS HIS CONSTITUENTS. DUBLIN, Sept. 2. The visit of Michael Collins, Sinn Féin Minister of Commerce, and Commander in Chief of the Irish Republican Army, is attracting great attention here. It has been announced that Collins purposes to address a meeting at Armagh on Sunday. Armagh is the district in which the Orange Association was first organized, and Orangemen are declared to regard the visit of Collins as an invasion of their territory by a rebel. Collins was elected to the Northern Parliament for Londonderry.

BELFAST'S DAILY TALE. BELFAST, Sept. 2. Shooting occurred this afternoon in the Falls Division of the city, but the outbreak was not serious. Townsend, Collins and Melbourne Streets were the scenes of disturbances.

BARBARA W. ASHORE. BLOCK ISLAND, R.I., Sept. 2. The three master schooners Barbara, of Narragansett, N.S., bound from Portland, Me., for St. John, N.B., with cargo, was ashore at Sandy Point, on the west side of Block Island to-night, and struck early in the day in a thick fog.

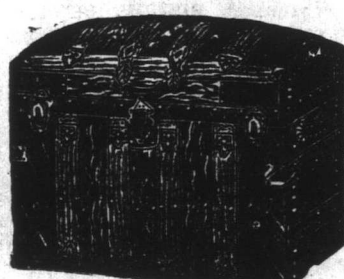
