Former Newfoundlander

DECEASED

The following obituary notice is taken from the columns of the "Evening Telegram" of June 14. The late Mr. Wm. H. Mills, who was born in St. John's, Nfld., and who had been residing in St. John's, Nfld., for many years, died at his home in St. John's, Nfld., on June 14, 1922, at the age of 66 years.

The whole community at St. John's was deeply shocked this (Tuesday) morning by the sudden death of Mr. W. H. Mills. It is not hard to sense the fact that the town has lost one who held a part therein and enjoyed the respect of his fellow citizens, based on character and accomplishment. It is as though everyone is talking of the loss of a personal friend, as Mr. Mills had no enemies and all have been the better for associating with him. He was a true friend and one of Summerside's most

upright and best citizens. About midnight on Monday, after attending to his store all day and working in his garden during the evening, he was preparing to go to bed when he was suddenly seized with hemorrhage of the brain, and passed away about an hour later, at the age of 66 years. The deceased was a native of Newfoundland, but came to Summerside as a boy and early in life started to work in the store of the late Mr. David Rogers, starting for himself later in business on Water Street as a fancy goods merchant, a business which he successfully carried on to the day of his death. There are left to mourn a sorrowing widow, two sons, and two daughters, namely: Mr. Ernest Mills, of Messrs. Sinclair & Stewart, Ltd., Summerside; Mr. Henry Mills, in Edmonton, Alberta; Mrs. Leroy Albers, and Miss Ruth Mills, of New York, to whom our deepest sympathy is extended in their sudden affliction. Mr. Holden C. Mills, of Summerside, is a cousin, and brother-in-law of the deceased, who was also an officer and very active member of the Church of England.
