Postal Reforms.

We rejoice exceedingly that if members of Parliament have as yet done nothing but listen to themselves talk, they have given indications that they intend to do something by-and-by to meet the wishes of the people in the matter of reducing the rates of postage.

From Ottawa.

It was reported last night that Mr. Rose is to enter the Cabinet, and that he will be sworn in to-morrow. He brings no strength to the Government.

For the first time in the history of the country the Post Office revenue, for the year ending 30th June last, exceeded one million dollars.

The Judges of Nova Scotia have refused to accept their quarter's salaries at the rates formerly paid in that Province—from £700 to £800 per annum—claiming the right to be paid since the first of July at the same rate as the Canadian Judges, being nearly double their former salary.

Parliament of Canada.

HOUSE OF COMMONS. OTTAWA, Nov. 15.

The following government notices of motions were given for Tuesday next:— Sir J. A. Macdonald—A bill respecting interpretation and construction of statutes; also resolutions respecting the indemnity of members and the salaries of the speakers of both houses.

Mr. Langevin—A bill respecting the department of the Secretary of State of Canada.

Mr. McDougall—A bill respecting the public works of the Dominion.

Mr. Tilley—A bill relating to the Customs department.

Mr. Morris enquired whether the government had in contemplation to introduce a measure for the creation of a public stock, in which it should be legal to invest trust funds.

In reply to Mr. J. H. Cameron, Sir J. A. Macdonald stated it was the intention of the government to submit to Parliament, during the present session, a plan for the establishment of a government Savings Bank.

In reply to Mr. Dufresne, Sir J. A. Macdonald said the provincial government had no power to establish a mint in the Dominion.

Mr. Masson enquired whether the government intended to introduce a measure for the enlargement of the Welland and St. Lawrence Canals. Mr. McDougall said the government fully recognized the great importance of this subject, but did not think the finances of the Dominion would justify such a measure at present.

Mr. Young enquired whether the government intended to take steps to reduce the rates of ocean and inland postage and to abolish newspaper postage. Sir J. A. Macdonald replied that the government were to deal with the subject by a measure which would shortly be submitted to Parliament and would speak for itself.

Mr. Morrison enquired whether the government intended to introduce a measure for the regulation of the value of foreign silver coinage as part of the currency of the Dominion. Sir John A. Macdonald said the government would introduce a bill on the currency, which would include the particular subject mentioned.

Quite an interesting debate occurred on the motion brought up by Dr. Parker for an address to his Excellency praying that he will be pleased to lay before this House copies of any representations addressed to his Excellency by members of this House, respecting the marks of royal favor which Her Majesty had been pleased to confer upon them, and of all despatches on the same subject, or from Her Majesty's principal Secretary of State for the colonies.

HUMILIATING CONTRAST.

The travelling correspondent of the Boston Journal points out, under date London, 23rd Oct., the humiliating difference between the credit of the United States Government and that of other nations.

STILL SULKY.

The Ottawa correspondent of the Hamilton Times, in speaking of the pageant at the opening of Parliament, says:—“Neither Mr. Cartier nor Mr. Lan. evin, wore the brass-coloured livery or Court uniform in which the other members of the Government ensnawed their symmetrical limbs and majestic trunk.”

THE GRAND TRUNK.—A petition was presented to the Senate to-day, by the Grand Trunk Railway, for a bill, notice of the provisions of which was given in the Gazette some time since.

Serious Charge Against Brewers.

The Hamilton Times calls attention to the fact that the most monstrous frauds are perpetrated upon the revenue by the brewers of the country, through the wretched system of collecting the excise duties on ale and beer now in force.
