

Discouraged.

Nomination Day a Severe Blow to the Manitoba Opposition.

Eight of Mr. Greenway's Supporters Elected by Acclamation.

And Not One Opponent-Winnipeg Returns Two Ministers-The List of Candidates.

Winnipeg, Jan. 9.—Nomination day was a discouraging one to the Conservative Opposition in Manitoba. The election yesterday by acclamation of eight straight Liberals to support Mr. Greenway has completely disorganized the opposition ranks, and it will be a very small corporal's guard facing the members of the Manitoba Legislature when the new Legislature meets. It was the original intention of the Opposition to place candidates in every constituency by orders from Ottawa, but gradually the men chosen as victims withdrew, and today Premier Greenway has eight supporters on his school and general policy without a ballot being cast. Those returned unopposed yesterday were: Birtle, C. J. Mickle, Government; Lakeside, Dr. C. R. Mickle, Government; Minto, Mr. H. Myers, Government; Souris, Mr. A. M. Campbell, Government; Springfield, Mr. T. H. Smith, Government; Winnipeg Center, Hon. C. McMillan, Government; Winnipeg South, Hon. J. D. Cameron, Government; Westbourne, Mr. T. L. Morton, Government. Against this not one Opposition candidate was elected and Government candidates are out in all except the French constituencies. In this city the surprise was the withdrawal of Mr. Laxton's candidature from the South Winnipeg against Hon. J. D. Cameron. Mr. Laxton is snowed in the mountains and wired his friends he did not think it advisable to run. In Center Winnipeg no candidate could be found to face the popular Col. McMillan, Provincial Treasurer, and he also was returned by acclamation.

New Stars.

Clusters That Vary Their Brilliance With Each Hour.

Photographed in Far Peru—What the Harvard Observatory Has Done to Chart the Heavens—Mrs. Fleming at Her Work.

Two discoveries of unusual interest have been announced at the Harvard Observatory—one of a "new star" in the constellation Carina and the other of several clusters of "variable stars." Both occurred in the southern hemisphere, and were recorded on photographs taken by the telescopes at the branch station at Arequipa, Peru. It was not until the plates were shipped to Cambridge and there examined that the discoveries were actually made.

The "new star" referred to is not one that has always existed and has just been observed by astronomers, but one of the class that comes into existence suddenly, increases in radiance until it reaches its greatest brilliancy and then fades into obscurity or entirely disappears.

Nova Carinae, as the new star is called, is the fifteenth to be discovered in two thousand years. The one preceding the last, seen October 26, 1893, was also discovered at the Harvard Observatory. The Cambridge method is a most admirable and effective one. The photographic plates

Sinking of a Large Steamer Off Halifax Coast.
