METEOROLOGICAL

Toronto, March 16-8 p.m.—The low area which was approaching the middle Atlantic coast last evening, moved very quickly northward across New England, and is now centered near Father Point. A fairly heavy snowstorm has prevailed in Quebec, and rain, with a southwest gale, in the Maritime Provinces. The high area in the west is gradually dispersing, but the temperature continues low. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 26-62; Kamloops, 30-54; Calgary, 22-44; Prince Albert, 12 below-18; Qu'Appelle, 16 below-6; Port Arthur, 4 below-12; Barry Sound, 8 below-20; Toronto, 2-22; Ottawa, 4-20; Montreal, 4-20; Quebec, 4-30; Halifax, 32-42.

Local temperatures: Highest, 17° above; lowest, 9.5° above.

Today sun rises 6:27 a.m., sets 6:26 p.m. Moon rises 8:07 p.m., sets 6:35 p.m.

—Miss Ethel Barry, youngest daughter of Mrs. M. Barry, 506 Adelaide Street, who has been ill for some months with internal trouble, has been unconscious since Wednesday.

—The general stock of N. McKenzie & Co., of Wyoming, valued at \$4,750, was sold by Mr. J. W. Jones, yesterday, for 65 cents on the dollar. On motion of Ald. Cooper, debentures will be granted for Victoria school and Park street school, that is for \$20,800.

The following grants were made to the various charities: Charities Organization, \$200; Children's Aid Society, \$500; Protestant Orphans' Home, \$350; Mount Hope Orphanage, \$200; W. C. T. U., \$200; Salvation Army Home, \$75; Convalescent Home, \$100.

In relation to the firemen's petition for an increase in salaries, Ald. Cooper moved that it be granted, and the recommendation of No. 3 committee adopted.

Ald. Winder moved in amendment, that salaries remain as they are. The amendment carried. Ald. Dreaney being the only supporter of the original motion.

City hall salaries were next considered. The expenses of the mayor's office were again placed at \$700. Assistant Engineer's salary was placed at \$300, an increase of \$20. Assistant Engineer Kirkpatrick's salary was increased \$50. Secretary of Committee Bell was given an increase of \$50, making his salary \$800.

Clerk Jolly was given an increase of \$82, bringing his salary up to \$400 yearly, and Clerk Tambling's salary was placed at \$353, an increase of \$100.

Miss Nellie Bell was given an increase of \$50, making her salary \$300. City hall at a yearly salary of \$300, an increase of \$50. Weigh scales Clerk Dean's salary was increased to \$520 a year, and the assessors' at \$500 a year.

Altho the matter was before the council, it was not taken up.

A grant of \$35 to the Seventh Band, \$20 to the Musical Society Band, and \$15 to the Salvation Army Band was made for their services at the Lady-smith celebration.

Action in relation to fistic exhibitions was deferred.

Several minor matters were dealt with.

RECOMMEND LARGE DEBENTURE ISSUE

Money for New Schools on Victoria and Park Streets—Queen's Avenue and West London Schools Will Wait—Grants to Charities—Salaries Increased.

Chairman Jolly, Ald. Dreaney, Winder, Stephenson, Bamed, Cooper, Mayor Rumball and Secretary Pope were present at a regular meeting of the finance committee, held last night.

Mr. R. A. Bayly, chairman of the board of education, and Mr. John Macpherson, chairman of No. 1 committee of the board were present, and asked for the issue of \$30,000 in debentures for the erection of new schools and the repair of old ones. For Victoria school \$11,800 was needed to make a six-room addition; to make Park street school a six-room school \$9,200 was asked. To build a two-room school in place of Queen's Avenue kindergarten would cost \$4,200; and for a two-room school in West London they would require \$5,000, a total of \$30,000.

The deputation presented a statement of their side of the case, and stated plainly that if the debentures were not issued they would find it absolutely necessary to place a very large sum in their estimates whereupon to make repairs, and if this were done, the council, according to law, could not refuse to grant it.

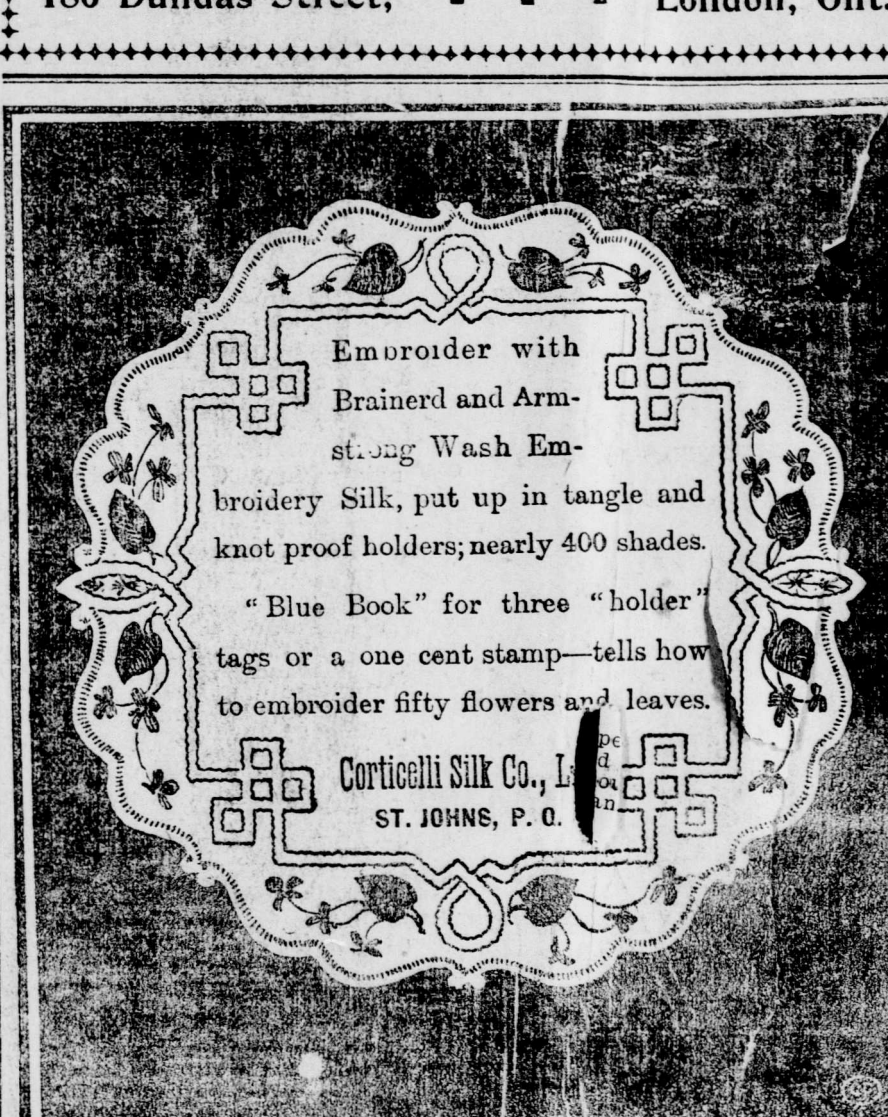
