THE PROSPECTS FOR FRUIT AND GRAIN

Throughout Ontario Are at Present Good-More Farm Lectures.

Toronto, April 11.-Reports from almost all points in Ontario indicate that the fall wheat has wintered in comparative safety. On light soil the plant is healthy, and under heavier conditions, where the land is rolling. the promise is good. Only on level fields, where ice formed, there were patches where the plants are killed. On the whole an average crop may safely be counted on.

FRUIT PROSPECTS.

A member of the Toronto Globe staff visited the fruit belt east of Hamilton a day or two since, and found that peaches, plums, pears and other fruits had passed the ordeal of winter in entire safety. In a chat with Mr. E. D. Smith, M.P., of the Helderleigh nurseries at Winona, that gentleman expressed himself as fully satisfied with the outlook. In speaking of the possibility of profitably shipping our finer fruits to the Northwest, Mr. Smith said that the difficulty was not in packing, but in the fact that our climate does not produce fruits adapted for long shipments as California The search is now for varieties which will bear transportation, and that in this the fruit-growers would be successful. Incidentally Mr. Smith asserted that the H., G. and B. Electric Railway had added fully fruit farm between Hamilton and Beamsville; that he alone had shipped 200 cars of freight over it last year, and that the electric road is an invaluable asset.

MORE FARM LECTURES. A staff of five lecturers has been sent out by Mr. G. C. Creelman, superintendent of Farmers' Institutes, to address the various local horticultural societies in the province. In addition to the evening meetings, the lecturers will hold afternoon meetings for school children, when they will give heart to heart talks on nature study. Creelman proposes by this means to draw the rural and urban population more closely together.

Teachers in Council.

Toronto, April 10.-At the education convention, in the inspectors' section, Inspector Silcox, of St. Thomas, made a strong plea for an increase in the number of male teachers in Ontario. He believed that much of the inefficiency of teaching was due to the replacing of males by females. The male teachers of Ontario now numbered less than 30 per cent of the whole. Their actual numbers had not increased since 1867, while the number of female teachers had increased from 2,041 to 6.120. The inspectors elected officers as follows: Chairman, K. R. Logtwenty dollars to the value of every head, Clinton; secretary, Wm. Wilson; director, John Dearness; London. The mathematical section passed a resolution to the effect that the time for introducing the metric system into Canada had not yet arrived.

At the general meeting officers were elected as follows: President, John Henderson, St. Catharines; secretary, R. W. Doan (re-elected); treasurer, W. J. Hendrie (re-elected). A resolution was adopted by a large

majority urging the adoption of a superannuation system to be operated under control of the minister of education. Prof. Robertson, of Ottawa, delivered an address on Manual Training, with special reference to the classes now being established at various

centers through the generosity of Sir William Macdonald, of Montreal. THE MURDER OF WM. RICE.

Close of Patrick's Preliminary Trial.

Evidence of Hand-Writing Experts and Medical Men-Court's Decision Reserved.

New York, April 11. - At the close of the taking of testimony yesterday in the proceedings against Albert T. Patrick, accused of causing the death of Wm. Marsh Rice, Justice Jerome said whether a case sufficiently strong had been presented to warrant the holding of Patrick on the charge of murder until Monday next. Patrick was

remanded until that time.

The defense waived examination in the forgery charges against Patrick, David L. Short and Maurice Meyer, and they were held for the grand jury. Bail for Short and Meyer was fixed at \$10,000 each. The amount of Patricks bail on the forgery charge was not

EFFORTS TO PROVE FORGERY, As stated yesterday, William J. Kinsley, called by Assistant District Attorney Osborne as an expert on handwriting, expressed the opinion that checks paid by Swenson & Co., and signed by William M. Rice, were not

Mr. Osborne then handed the witness the assignment on the Fifth Avenue Trust Company, and what is known as the "cremation letter," and Kinsley said: "I have already compared the signatures on these papers with the admitted signatures of the late Mr. Rice, and I say that in my opinion, were not written by the same

MEDICAL TESTIMONY. Prof. Rudolph Willhus, the analyst, was the next witness. He testified to having received from Dr. Donly the heart, kidneys, liver, stomach and in-testines from the body of William Marsh Rice. He analyzed the different organs, and found traces of mer-cury in the stomach. In the intestines he found about half a grain of mercury and about one-ninth of a grain of mercury in the liver. There was not sufficient mercury to cause death, but the presence of it in the organs indicated that a larger quantity had been taken by the deceasedjust how much he could not determine. Defendant's counsel, Moore, asked whether the quantity of mercury found in Rice's body indicated that the man

had taken sufficient to cause death. The answer was "No. This ended the taking of testimony, and there was a recess until half-past one, when the attorneys' argument was begun,

ARGUMENT FOR DEFENSE. Lawyer Moore prefaced his argument in behalf of Patrick by asking Justice Jerome to discharge the accused lawyer from custody on four grounds.
