

# AT TRADE CENTERS

Heat and Holidays Affect Business at Some Points.

THE FALL TRADE IS IMPROVING

Wholesale Houses Are Busier-Generally Lower Prices for Farm Produce in the States.

Toronto, Aug. 1.—Bradstreet's weekly

London wholesale trade is improving in regard to fall staples, but the sorting trade in seasonable lines is rather slow, as a result of the cool weather The crop outlook is good, in spite of reports of some sprouting of fall wheat. The trade situation is healthy and the prospects are bright.

In wholesale trade circles at Toronto this week has seen a fair movement for this season. While the sorting trade in seasonable lines has been slow, the fall orders have been fairly numerous, and the outlook is for a large increase in such lines the next six or eight weeks. The values of domestic staple goods continue very firm, and the factories and mills, being busy on orders, do not seem prepared to offer any job lots below current

Trade at Montreal is only moderately active. Business is being affected by the holiday season, both in the city and in the country points, where many people are now absent at the summer resorts. The outlook for the fall business is very encouraging, and if the western wheat crop is harvested without damage, a very brisk and large sorting trade is looked for the next two

months. Trade conditions at Quebec show no new features. Midsummer dullness prevails and the weather has marred tourist traffic, which shows a considerable falling off as compared with previous seasons. Crops are generally reported in a fairly healthy condition. Ottawa wholesale trade is fairly ac-

tive for this season. Jobbers are experiencing a fair demand for fall goods for shipment later on, but the sorting trade in summer goods is not specially

brisk. In trade circles at Pacific Coast cities there is a rather better demand for staple goods than at this time last year. The provincial industries are all very busy, especially in lumber, and the canneries are beginning to show more activity since the fish began to The trade outlook is improving. run. In Winnipeg there has been rather less activity in wholesale circles. The job bing business, however, keeps fairly active, although there is the usual conservatism noticeable when the crops are at this stage of their growth. The large increase in the population of the province has made it necessary for retailers to carry larger stocks.

IN THE STATES. Dun & Co.'s review: A check to the rising prices of stock and grain is not an unfavorable sign. Manipulated prices for July grain options were not conducive to domestic consumption of shipments abroad, and the lower quo-

tations now prevailing will have a salutary effect on legitimate trade. Manufacturing plants are well occupied as a rule-iron and steel leading, followed by textiles and footwear. Fuel scarcity is still causing delay, although coks ovens are surpassing all previous figures of output and bituminous mines

are vigorously operated.

In textile manufacturing the feature was the opening of men's wear-worsted fabrics for next spring-with a general advance of 2½ to 10 cents. Other worsteds reflected the better tone more or less, but new lines of all-wool goods are offered at last season's prices. A fairly brisk demand is reported, yet some buyers evidently expect that the new list will not be maintained, as they are slow to place orders.

Cotton goods tend in favor of purchasers, owing to the prospect of a large cotton crop and the tendency of goods to accumulate because of the light export movement.

Shoe shops are active on spring samples and buyers are numerous in the Boston market. There has been a very striking ad-

vance in leather, which this week has again followed the upward movement of hides, stimulated by heavy purchases. Hides have made further sensation-

al advances in Colorado steers, reporting new high record prices. Failures during the month of July testify to the prosperous condition of the nation's trade and industry. Only one more of the preceding 32 recorded a smaller aggregate of defaulted indebtedness, while, omitting the few exceptionally heavy failures, the average liability to each default was much smaller than in the corresponding month of any year during the decade. There were 825 suspensions in July, 1902, involving a total indebtedness of
