LOVE IN LONDON LAW IN TORONTO

Romance Begun in Forest City Leads to the Courts in the Queen City.

Last evening's Toronto Star tells the following story of a love affair which had its beginning in London, and which is now playing the last act in the courts of Toronto.

Cupid, the little fellow with the magical bow and arrows, did not inflict a very deep wound in the heart of Mr. W. J. Patterson, of this city, for Mrs. Jennie McArthur, also of Toronto, is to be believed.

She is suing him for unstated damages for breach of promise of marriage. She is a pretty young widow, about 28 years old, and he is a widower with one child.

The couple made each other's acquaintance in a casual way in London, Ont., some two years ago. It is said, and the statement is also made that it was a case of love at first sight. At any rate, each was favorably impressed with the other, and the casual acquaintance ripened into an ardent courtship.

Mrs. McArthur asserts that Patterson promised to marry her as soon as was convenient. Unfortunately, however, it seemed that the ardor of his affection waned. She was not inclined to favor delay, and he promised several times, she says, to have the ceremony performed.

But delay followed delay, and Mrs. McArthur grew impatient. Hope deferred maketh the heart sick, said Solomon; and she found it to be true. The wedding day was finally fixed, she says, for Christmas last. At that time Patterson expected to inherit a considerable fortune. But Christmas came and went, and he did not call in the preacher.

Recently she urged upon him again the necessity of action by a letter from her lawyer, Mr. Louis F. Heyd. Then the laggard lover made an appointment to meet the widow, and, to quote her again, assured her that they would be wedded within ten days. The lawyer advised her to have it done that night, but she granted the groom the ten days' grace. The wedding did not take place at the appointed time.

This morning Mr. Heyd, in behalf of the woman, issued the writ against Patterson. He says the case will probably go to trial.

JURY EXONERATES POLICE OFFICERS

The Death of Wesley Henderson Found To Be Due to Alcoholic Poisoning.

There were street rumors yesterday to the effect that evidence of a sensational character was to be given in the evening at the investigation of Wesley Henderson's death. Henderson was the young man who died in the police cells the other morning, and it was said yesterday that witnesses were to be called to show that he had been roughly handled by the police at the time of his arrest for drunkenness. However, nothing of this kind transpired. On the contrary, witnesses who saw the officers taking Henderson to the police station said that they could not have taken him more gently, as they handled him as they would a child.

A storekeeper named Duffon, from Thorndale, was called, and he said that at Henderson's home he took hold of the dead man's arm and thought from its limp condition that it must have been broken. He also noticed a mark on the side of the head, near the temple. The latter was shown to have been a very slight dent, and not such an injury as would be caused by a blow of any kind. The jury exonerated the police from any blame. The verdict:

"We find that the said Wesley Henderson came to his death on or about the 26th of February, 1906, in the corridor of the cells in the police court in the city of London from acute alcoholic poisoning in accordance with the finding of the medical witnesses, and we exonerate the police force from any blame in the matter."

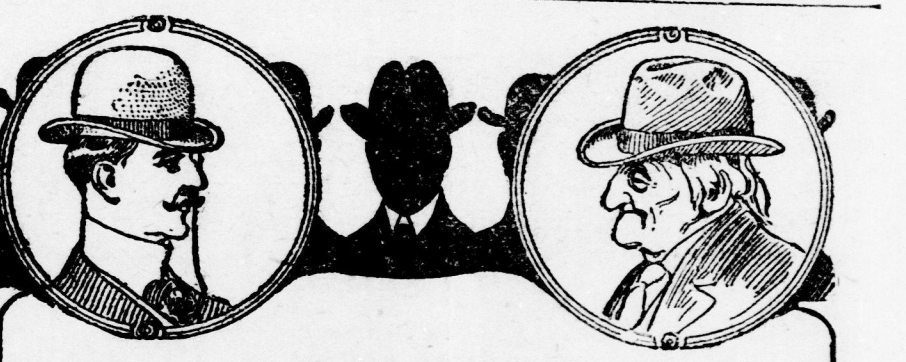
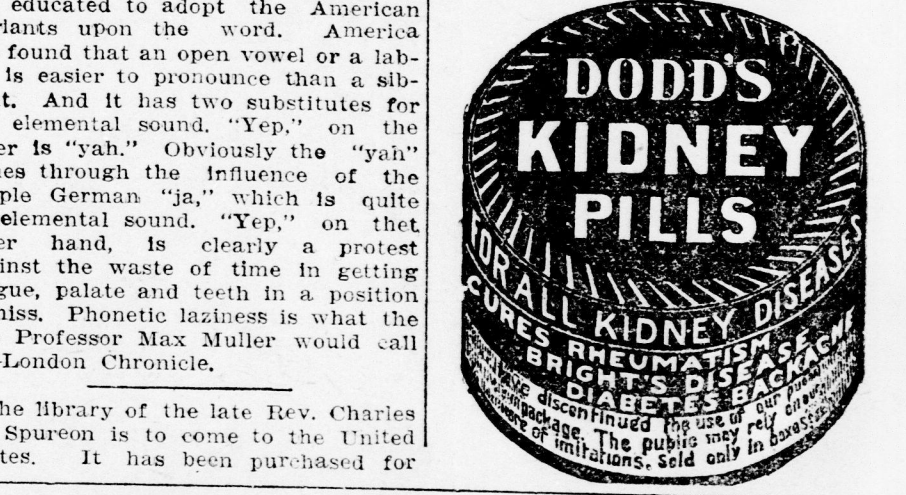

Yes, Yep and Ja.

The simple English affirmative is becoming somewhat battered in common speech. "Yes" has long sounded as "yus" from the lips of the uneducated.

But there is a present tendency among the educated to adopt the American variants upon the word. America has found that an open vowel or a labial is easier to pronounce than a sibilant. And it has two substitutes for an elemental sound, "Yep," on the one hand, and "yah," obviously the "yah" comes through the influence of the simple German "ja," which is quite an elemental sound. "Yep," on the other hand, is clearly a protest against the waste of time in getting tongue, palate and teeth in a position to hiss. Phonetic laziness is what the late Professor Max Muller would call it.—London Chronicle.
