The policy of public ownership and operation of public utilities has some pretty strong opponents in the Dominion senate, if we may judge from a recent debate in that House. The ground was taken by some of the speakers that a business conducted by an individual, a firm or a joint stock company, is, as a rule, managed with greater economy, care, capacity and enterprise than one owned and operated by the state. ed to as a country which has made public ownership a success. At present Australia owns and operates railways, tramways, telegraphs and other utilities, but at immense cost to the people. Thirty-five years ago Australia's public debt was \$150,000,000; in IMMIGRANTS CANADA WANTS 1905, it was \$1,450,000,000, or a per capita debt of \$309.66, as compared with the United Kingdom's \$91.68, the United States \$11.95, and Canada's, \$45.
