BRANTFORD SIGNS WITH CATARACT

Company Must Furnish Power Ten Per Cent Cheaper Than the Hydro-Electric.

Brantford, March 15.-The ouncil tonight adopted the bylaw ratilying the agreement with the Western Counties Power Company now operating here as a subsidiary of the Cataract Power Company. In 1906 the company was given a

-years' franchise for commercial and domestic lighting here at a maximum rate of nine cents per kilowatt. Its street lighting contract with the city, however, at a rate of \$55 per light per year expired last September, and has continued until the present without a specific agreement.

Under the new agreement the company gets a five-years' contract chargstreet lighting and \$7 65 per kilowatt for commercial and domestic lighting. On street lighting this is a saving of said Dubuisson. "A true story is worth \$8,750. 


