chester asked Mr. Staunton. "If they are under the code I have jurisdiction. If any of the offenses are under common law I fear I cannot try the case."

The indictment was read again and Mr. Staunton was requested to consider whether or not any of the offenses were outside the criminal code and under the common law.

The indictmet is very long, covering a number of years and many places in Ontario. It covered five different offenses and twenty-two counts.

Judge Winchester finally agreed to ake the case, and the defendants were isked to plead, but Mr. Johnston took rojection to the form of indictment. The indictment was not in legal shape, ne contended, and it consisted of twenty or more paragraphs.

Each was a separate charge and a separate conspiracy. This was oblectionable as there was only one conspiracy. There should be separate charges but one conspiracy. He maintained that no judge would try a series of conspiracies. A conspiracy Charge should be made, not a series of onspiracies. Therefore he objected to the indictment, declaring it was not

Claims Charges Are Outlawed. Mr. Johnston then argued that the menses charged were outlawed. He had full cognizance of the law, he said, and in the cases of Queen vs. Binn. and Queen vs. Thompson, his contenlaw no longer recognized the offenses of bribery and kindred offences as they were outlined. True conspiracy consists in intent or agreement, but a conspiracy to commit crimes which no longer existed can hardly be imagined. The conspiracy, therefore, was dead.

indictment in that it had been amplified since it had been brought in by the grand jury. This was specially true of the clauses referring to the opening of the ballot boxes.

Another objection was that the inindictment should be explicit as to whether the conspiracy took place in Toronto or in London, or in some other place. Conspiracy could not take place in several parts of the country. The acts complained of in London and other places might explain the conspiracy and amplify it, but the indictment should have some definite place of commencement, either in Toronto or London.
