EVILS OF THE
DRINK TRAFFIC

Meetings in Auditorium in Connection With Temperance Campaign.

The meetings in behalf of the temperance campaign, which were held in the Auditorium yesterday, were marked by a great enthusiasm. At the afternoon mass meeting for men the hall was crowded. Rev. B. Spence, of Toronto, gave an illustrated lecture, showing, by means of cartoons, the evils of the drink traffic, and making a strong appeal for the abolition of the bar and the treating system. Mr. Joseph Gibson, postmaster of Ingersoll, and president of the Dominion Alliance, and a lifelong foe of the traffic ever since he saw the ruin it has wrought in his own boyhood home, spoke with a great enthusiasm, and gave many effective illustrations of the horrors that liquor had brought into the lives of many people. The attendance at the evening mass meeting was considerably lessened by the rain, but even despite it the body of the hall was well filled when the Rev. Mr. Sims, of Toronto, began his address. Forsaking the personal side of the question, Mr. Sims took up the economic aspect and sanely and clearly, with nothing of ranting or exaggeration, showed how the liquor traffic was, beyond all question, becoming a destructive factor in our economic life. Personal liberty has nothing to do with this question, he said, for again there comes in the principle that laws must exist for the greatest good of the greatest number. It has been argued that trade would suffer. Mr. Sims pointed out conclusively by arguments drawn from the actions of one and another grocer's operation, that liquor results invariably in an economic waste. What would we do without hotels? was a question often asked, but there was no question of abolishing the hotel, but only the bar, and, said the speaker, there is no more necessary connection between a bar and an hotel than there is between a red-haired woman and a white horse. It is because we have thought of them together so long that we have come to think them inseparable, not because there is any sound reason for their being really so.

"We cannot lay the responsibility," Mr. Sims concluded, "for the bar upon the barkeeper, or the Government. When we, the citizens, have the power to close the bars and do not do it, the blame must lie at our doors. We have the mighty weapon of the ballot, and if, said the speaker, you put the cross on your ballot where you see the cross of Christ, the question will be settled without fail."

Mr. Spence closed the meeting with another illustrated lecture, dealing in a semi-grotesque way with the great battles of the temperance cause.

Christ Church.

A large congregation was present at Christ Church last night, when Rev. S. W. Howard preached on "The Second Coming of Christ," taking his text from the second epistle of Peter 11, "Seeing then that all these things shall be dissolved." Mr. Howard emphasized strongly the need of right living in order that we may be in a fit state to stand before our Judge when the time comes. Christ's second coming will be for judgment, and we cannot be Christians unless we believe in Christ's second coming. At the

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New St. James' Church.

"Courage" was the theme of Rev. Thomas Mitchell's sermon at the New St. James' Church last night. Mr. Mitchell pointed out many examples of courage and bravery in battles, but thought this was not particularly the kind of courage that we should try to attain. Moral courage and courage to stand for what is right is much more important than courage of any kind that is not worthy of the cause in which it is spent.

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STRONG PLEAS
FOR TEMPERANCE

Sermons Preached in Thirty
Pulpits on Sunday.

THE BEGINNING OF ADVENT

In the Anglican and Roman Catholic Church of the City.

Sunday was a day of considerable interest in local churches, and large congregations were present at both morning and evening services.

In thirty of the pulpits special addresses on temperance were given, and a strong appeal made to different congregations to support local option and to do away with the liquor traffic.

In the Catholic and Anglican churches of the city yesterday marked the beginning of Advent.

Dundas Centre Church.

At Dundas Centre Church last evening Mr. Joseph Gibson, of Ingersoll, president of the Dominion Alliance, spoke on temperance, and his remarks were especially directed to the young men present. Mr. Gibson chose as his text, Proverbs xxiii, 22, "Look not thou upon the wine when it is red." "Young men and old," he said, "you cannot exaggerate the danger of the liquor traffic. Every one of us who wish to succeed in life, must make proper use of his or her time. This the drunkard can not do. Time is the most precious thing in the world and no man can afford to fritter it away in dissipation and drink. Young men particularly, you will hear others say, 'I can take a drink when I like, or I can let it alone.' This has been the downfall of thousands. They could take it, but the time came when they could not let it alone. You men by your votes are just as bad as the saloonkeeper, if you vote to maintain him. Even if you do not touch a drop yourself, you are just as bad, for you are preventing others who do from having their temptation removed."

Former London Pastor.

It was announced that next Sunday Rev. E. B. Lancelotti will be absent in Rev. Hope attending the opening of a new church there. Mr. Lancelotti's place here will be taken by Rev. J. W. Graham, formerly pastor of the First Methodist Church, in the morning and by Rev. Dr. Dougall, of Goderich, in the evening.

Season of Advent.

The season of Advent will be one of particular interest to members of particular churches, and special sermons will be preached in St. Paul's Cathedral, as follows: Wednesday, Dec. 2, "Preparation for the Judgment," Rev. R. S. W. Howard, of Christ Church; Sunday, Dec. 6, Rev. F. A. P. Chadwick, of All Saints' Church, Windsor; both on both morning and evening services; Wednesday, Dec. 9, "The Coming King," Rev. W. T. Hill, pastor of St. John the Evangelist Church; Sunday, Dec. 13, Rev. J. Munday, of Grace Church, Port Huron, will preach both morning and evening; Wednesday evening, Dec. 16, "Christ Coming for His Bride," Rev. William Lowe.

Sunday, Dec. 20, the services will be taken by Canon Dann and Rev. Mr. Perdue.

Christmas Carols.

The old English custom of singing carols at Christmas time will be revived at St. Paul's Cathedral. The choir of famous old English carols, and a beautiful programme of them has been arranged, and will be sung in the cathedral on Wednesday evening, Dec. 23.

St. Paul's Cathedral.

Last night at St. Paul's, Canon Dann preached a special sermon to mark the beginning of Advent, taking as his subject "Christ the Judge." He contrasted the second coming of Christ with his first coming. Then he descended to our level and came among us as one of us. At his second coming, however, he will come in all His majesty, and we must come to his level. His coming will be the winding up of the present age. Canon Dann showed that many people have the most vague ideas respecting the consecutive events following death. Some people talk of men dying and going right to heaven. That is incorrect. No one will enter into Heaven until after the judgment. All should try to live so that they will be prepared to stand before Christ when He comes.

DELEGATES REPORT
WOMEN'S COUNCIL

Important Meeting of National
Branch Held on Friday.

The meeting of the London Branch of the National Council of Women, held at the Y. M. C. A., on the 27th inst., was largely attended. Its objects being to receive the reports of the delegates to the fifteenth annual meeting, lately held at Ottawa, to discuss possibilities of local usefulness, to offer to Miss Macnamara "a very small token of a very great regard" on losing her invaluable services as honorary treasurer, and to appoint as her successor, Mrs. R. M. Graham.

Covered Patrol.

An encouraging letter was read from the mayor, giving assurance that the matter of the covered patrol wagon was being attended to by himself and the police commissioners. It having been pointed out by the Local Council of Women that ten years ago an appeal for the same had been made by them and a promise given to the same effect.

Important Measures.

Amongst the important measures brought before the consideration of the National Council and reported by its delegates was that an appeal should be made to the Dominion Government to change the law in regard to the age of consent, making it 18 instead of 16 years, this being done as a protective measure on behalf of the very young girls who but too often are victims rather than wilful sinners, and who have to be received into maternity institutions in every city. A warning note was struck as to a fast-increasing effort to evade existing laws and to introduce under other disguises Mormon practices throughout the Dominion.

White Slaves.

The report by Mrs. R. M. Graham, of the ramifications of the iniquitous white slave traffic and other similar dangers to our young women by means of false advertisements, etc., was convincing that a veritable network to entrap its victims was growing into cruel dimensions, and called for a protective crusade from men and women alike. In regard to the coming quinquennial meetings of June, 1939, it was stated that over 1,000 representatives visitors from Europe alone were expected to attend, and that very possibly a special steamer would be chartered to convey them to Canada, "the brightest and bonniest shipload that ever crossed the Atlantic." Two European governments have notified the international executive that they are prepared to pay the expenses of an official delegate to the Canadian congress, and it "up to the Dominion to use this opportunity to give such a fitting welcome to the visitors from Europe and sister colonies as will make 1939 a record year for Canada.
