COMET WILL LEAVE ONLY SOME DUST

Washington, April 11.—Willis L. Moore, chief of the weather bureau, issued a statement today that will bring peace of mind to folks who are worrying about a possible collision with Halley's comet. Here is what Moore has to say:

"Popular apprehension regarding harm to the earth and its inhabitants during the impending visit of Halley's comet to this portion of the universe is unfounded. The result of a collision between the earth and the comet would depend upon a mass of the comet, the velocity of the bodies and the angle of impact. A collision in the present case will be impossible owing to safety margin between the tracks of the earth and the comet of

"The tail of the comet, through which the earth will probably pass, will be noticeable only as an absolutely harmless luminous gas or dust, and may produce electrical and magnetic effects that can be detected only by self-recording instruments. A source of possible danger or discomfort to the earth attending cometary visits would be the falling into the sun of a comet. As the least distance between Halley's comet and the sun in the present instance will be more than 54,000,000 miles, the possibility of discomfort from solar excitations will not exist."
