## DID BOMBARDMENT HIDE MINE LAYING?

English Traveller Believes the Attack Hid Object of Raid.

### SCARBOROUGH DESCRIBED

Stands Out Boldly From the Monotony of Coast Line—Excellent Target.

That the bombardment made by German cruisers on Scarborough, Hartlepool and Whitby, on the English coast, was in all probability only a ruse to draw attention while mines were laid, was the statement made by F. Dickinson, a Toronto traveller, who has spent many summers in Scarborough, before leaving England for this country, to an Advertiser reporter last night, while stopping over in this city.  
Mr. Dickinson gave a graphic description of the pretty and fashionable resort, which in the summer season is thronged with the elite of England, as well as a big representation of wealthy "on the continent."

The coast in the vicinity of Scarborough makes an excellent target for long-range guns, said Mr. Dickinson. "Scarborough stands out boldly from the monotony of the shore line, with its bright promenades and buildings. I cannot understand, though, why an attack should be concentrated on this point at this season of the year. When the season is at its height the place has a large population of holiday-makers, but just now there is nothing about it that would justify the attack being centred there."

Mr. Dickinson stated that there was an important Government wireless station at Scarborough, that was used by the war department. It was possible he said, that the shells had been intended to cripple the structure's usefulness.  
Hartlepool he described as a shipping and fishing centre. Whitby, like Scarborough, is at its best in the summer season.  
Not only the laboring classes, but sons of England's wealthy men, are eager to get to the front, declared Mr. Dickinson. He stated that in North Staffordshire he knew of one instance where four hundred young men, who had been ranked in the lap of luxury, had organized a company and gone with an English contingent to France.

Mr. Dickinson has two brothers at the front. Since leaving England he has had no word from them.

### FRENCH GOVT. IS ORDERING COATS.

## No Fatalities If Crossing Had Been Protected

Coroner's Jury Says Insufficient Safeguards For Life Provided By G. T. R.

Had the Eglerton street Grand Trunk Railway crossing been properly protected, there would have been no fatalities there on Monday, Dec. 14, was the substance of the verdict brought in by Coroner A. MacLaren's jury at police headquarters last night, after they heard Court Stenographer Gladys Gower read the evidence given by the witnesses in the Smith case on Wednesday night.  
The complete verdict was that the said Fred C. Whiting came to his death at Eglerton street crossing in the city of London, on December 14, by being struck by a west bound Grand Trunk express and instantly killed.  
We, the jury, find that there is not sufficient care taken by the Grand Trunk to safeguard life at this crossing. Had the said crossing been properly protected such a fatality as the one in question could not have occurred.  
From the great increase in the population of this side of the city and from, as a result the greatly increased traffic over this level crossing, we would strongly urge upon the city authorities to use their influence with the Dominion railway company to have these conditions rectified.  
Coroner MacLaren explained to the jurors that last night's inquest was made compulsory as the result of a new law that has been recently passed and that Mr. Whiting's death happened prior to Smith's and the Coroner MacLaren, had been summoned it also made two inquests necessary.  
The jurors were: W. H. Biggs, Marshall Miller, Jas. E. Orme, James Dean, George F. Dunn, James McLeod, Duncan McMillan, Harry Boss and C. R. Walker, foreman.
