Genoa, April 21 .- If the Russians e granted recognition and adequate financial help, they state in their reply submitted to the entente today, that they are willing to admit Rusria's war and pre-war debts, waive all counter claims and restore the use of nationalized property to its former owners or satisfy the claims of foreigners in cases where the property cannot be restored.

The clause of the Russian reply re lating to restoration of nationalized property to foreigners says: "The Russian government would be willing to restore to its former owners the use of property nationalized or withheld, or where this is impossible, to satisfy the just claims of the former owners.


