RETURNS IN EARLY IF DEPUTIES HELP

Biggar Replies To Press in Request of Assistance To Secure Quick Results.

RESULTS ACCURATE

Canadian Press Despatch Ottawa, Oct. 16 .- In reply to a request that he should assist the Canadian Press in securing as promptly as possible complete and accurate returns of the vote on election day, Col. O. M. Biggar, K.C., the chief electoral officer, said: "The returns do not reach me until long after polling day, and even returning officers only receive them by mail; they may not have them for several days after the poll. Every election officer, and particularly every deputy return-ing officer and poll clerk, should, ing officer and poll clerk, should however, do what he can to furnish to Canadian Press agencies, news-papers and their accredited corre-spondents as early in the evening as possible, accurate statements of the result of the vote at every polling station.

"On the completion of the count at the polling station, the deputy is required to complete several ments of the result. One of these is transmitted to the returning officer in the ballot box, and constitutes the primary official record of the vote at the poll in question, but the deputy retains a duplicate in his own possession. Similar statements are at the same time furnished to each of high the candidate's agents at the poll and sent by mail direct to each of the candidates personally. Immediately upon these statements being completed, the information therein contained is public property, and contained is public property, an every deputy and poll clerk, as w as every candidate's agent, should what lies in his power to notify figures to the press, and to the didates' organization with the possible delay.'
