

OLD BOYS AND GIRLS GREAT DAY AT PORT STANLEY

London's Old Boys Gather In Hundreds At Lakeside For Great Day of Sport

Baby Show and Races Feature Gala Day at Port Stanley.

Port Stanley, Aug. 9.—Old boys from London took possession of Port Stanley at an early hour today and with ever-increasing numbers soon made known to the residents that they were there for a day's fun.

And they had it. Hour after hour, on the heights, up and down the boardwalk, and in the water, the Old Boys and Girls of London certainly did nothing, undone that could be done to make the day a success. Aided by fine weather the sporting events were run off in quick time and the baby show concluded satisfactorily.

The first real contingent of visitors arrived shortly after 2 o'clock, and replying to the heights found those who had come earlier waiting for them around the roped-off race course. Headed by the band they marched to the playground, where the band took up its position in an enclosure, playing the rest of the afternoon.

With Mayor Wenig as chief announcer, the racing, the games, in number, were entered with much enthusiasm, and a great deal of amusement was caused at the contortions of some of the animals in the novelty events. In the bun-eating contest two boys were seen to get down on their hands and knees into the dirt and dust and finish eating their bread-crumbed buns. Both of them won prizes. Several duckings were received by the boys in the water race, but nothing else. In the 100 yards dash one man collapsed, but after having been laid on a bench for a few minutes recovered.

Form in Groups.
The races finished the huge crowd, but nothing of anything to eat and with one exception moved to the various places where refreshment for the inner man may be found. Groups of old boys could be seen strolling along the walk, some in the company of "hot dogs" or "hamburger." Many others filled the cafeteria to overflowing. Still others had the foresight or the courage to bring back lunches, and some of the picnic grounds little parties could be seen sitting around the tables and eating the home-prepared things as they did when the younger days, picked at the port.

Daylight fireworks, consisting of a series of bombs, which when bursting in the air discharged various paper shapes and figures of a balloon nature which filled with air and floated gracefully away. As these exploded it reminded one of an aerial plane gun, the report and smoke clouds being similar to those weapons of war.

After supper the visitors visited the ball ground where a fast game between the Brownies and Woolworth's girls softball teams was played. The umpire, a Londoner, was much criticised, and from the sarcastic shouts and praise of the crowds to the various teams, one would have imagined that it was a big league game.

Rushing Business.
Then again to the boardwalk where the many booths attracted those who wished to take home souvenirs of their day. These did a rushing business, and it is safe to say that scores of homes in different parts of the continent will contain mementoes of Port Stanley.

The warm sun and the calm water proved the strongest attraction for several hundred, who spent much of the afternoon in the water. Down the slide, out on the beach, and in the water, many of the old boys and girls acquired a first-class case of sunburn, but none of them worried about it. To them it was all in the day's fun and to be taken with the rest.

Crowds thronged the enclosure for the moving picture show in the evening when film plays were presented. In the cool of the evening many declared that it was the best spot they had struck during the day. Then more fireworks and a really presented pyrotechnical display of fireworks, rockets, candles, flares, bombs and many other kinds of night illuminations were thrown up into the clear sky.

Delve Back Into Past.
With their lapping up onto the beach, little groups of men or women, drawing their benches together, delved back into the past, and for two or three hours relived again the days when they had been able to come to Port every day if they so wished.

Taking it all in all, the old boys and girls decided that yesterday was certainly not the slowest, if any of the days could be called slow, since they arrived in London.

The sports program was a very successful feature of the day's outing, and the Old Boys and Girls who watched the races had a hilarious happy time, as many of the races were regular feature stunts which brought a hearty laugh from all the spectators. Mayor Wenig as official starter kept the fun at fever pitch and the time around the roped race enclosure never dragged a minute.

FEAR FOOD RIOTS IN RUHR DISTRICT

Situation Is Grave Due To Growing Restlessness of People.

FRENCH DETERMINED

Berlin, Aug. 9.—Passive resistance in the Ruhr and the Rhineland, which Chancellor Cuno yesterday informed the Reichstag would be continued until France decided to create an atmosphere conducive to negotiations with the authorities, is now approaching the stage where its further maintenance along peaceful lines will depend wholly on the government's ability to keep the resisting population well fed.

The falling mark, curtailment of local food supplies, due to natural shortages and the interrupted rail facilities, also the punitive measures which increasingly are being imposed by the French, now rapidly are contributing to the growing irritation and restlessness among the miners, steel workers and civil service employees.

The government's apprehensions in this direction are liberally shared by Hugo Stinnes, the Thyssens and other Ruhr industrialists, who equally are alarmed over the prospects of an era of lawlessness stimulated by the food shortage quite as much as they are apprehensive on account of the aggressive procedure of the French.

French Action Certain.
That the French authorities are determined to break down all resistance along the entire front, and will not be over scrupulous in their selection of methods to cause this end, is viewed here as an impending certainty, and also forecasting a season of sabotage, the ramifications of which cannot be foreseen in advance.

The French and Belgian authorities are now freely indulging in the practice of seizing the Reichsbank's funds which are destined to meet the miners' payrolls, but this is only one of the many factors which is aggravating the situation, as it leaves whole communities without currency to meet the demands of ordinary family shopping.

Realize Danger.
Chancellor Cuno's government is fully cognizant of the importance of safeguarding the food situation in the Ruhr, and is especially with reference to delivering winter supplies of potatoes before the frost sets in, and is now restricting railway schedules to the extent of eliminating certain passenger trains and urging agricultural producers to place the new crops at the government's disposal.

The Ruhr areas are chronically short of fresh milk, due to the spoiling of shipments which are delayed en route or detained by the French railway regime.

One proposal is for the German government to assume the task of feeding the miners and steel workers and their families in order to keep the resistance alive. It would mean feeding 1,000,000 families.

SAYS PROSPECTORS BURNING Bush Is Forestry Problem

Ottawa, Aug. 9.—Speaking at this afternoon's session of the British Empire Forestry Conference, E. J. Zavitz stated that one of the hardest problems to combat in Ontario forestry work was the practice followed by many prospectors of burning off the bush to expose minerals. G. H. Prince, chief forester for New Brunswick, stated that in his province fire prevention was the most important consideration. New Brunswick had experienced a very bad fire last spring, he said, and general sentiment now recognized the absolute necessity of exercising greater precautions to prevent such losses.

P. Z. Caverhill, chief forester for British Columbia, expressed the view that while it was necessary to have fire protection before we can have proper forest management, it would be impossible to delay the inauguration of forest management until fires are completely eliminated.

SHIP CARRIES FIRST CARGO CANADA EAST TO WEST

Montreal, Aug. 9.—Carrying the first general cargo ever shipped by water from eastern to western Canada, the Canadian steamship Mar-garet Coughlin left Montreal today for Vancouver via the Panama Canal. The sailing was arranged as an experiment to see whether sufficient business could be developed to make coast to coast sailings profitable, and it is stated that the experiment has proved successful in a large measure, although the ship was not quite full.
