## SHIPS AND SHIPPING.

There were on board the steamship Queen when she sailed for Alaska last evening over 240 excursionists, including a number from Victoria. Prominent among them were John W. Mackay, president of the Mackay-Bennett Cable Co.; C. R. Hoemer, manager of the Canadian Pacific telegraph, and General Francis Walker, president of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. The steamer arrived here from the Sound about 4 o'clock and sailed for the North four hours later. When backing out from the dock her steam calloped played a number of tunes and her and the Frisco steamer leaving port at the same time.

## THE "MONTICELLO'S" TROUBLE.

The steamer Monticello, built to carry passengers and freight on Puget Sound, had a most sensational trip down the coast to San Francisco. Her boiler burst off Point Arena, and for nearly forty-eight hours she floated in the open sea, until the steamer San Benito took her up and brought her safely to San Francisco. The owners of the Monticello had announced that she was intended to run to Valparaiso in company with the Southern Pacific steamer. Strangely enough, it was a Southern Pacific steamer that came to her rescue, and now has a claim for salvage against her.

In the first eight the three chief cities of the province will be well represented.

Westminster took the lion's share, it will be seen; Victoria has two strong men who have on several previous occasions worthily represented the province at Ottawa; and Corporal J. Duff Stewart of Vancouver deserves special mention on his success, because he was his only competitor from that city.
