Governor Hill, of the State of New York, has signed a bill which abolishes death by hanging, and substitutes electricity as a means to carry a criminal condemned of a capital crime out of the world. The new law surrounds the execution of the penalty with a secrecy and an uncertainty as to the time when it is to be inflicted which will theoretically compensate for the lessened dread of death. The condemned man will not know beforehand the exact day and hour of his execution, but he will be kept in solitary confinement, visited only by his relatives, physician, and priest, and the public will hear no more of him, except that on a certain day he was duly killed by electricity according to law.
