

skilled in balancing ourselves. We had two trains, each drawn by a single horse. We met some *dog-trains* that had come from Prince Rupert's Land, where there are extensive missions of the English Church, amongst the Aborigines of those parts. The *train* only can be used, by reason of the peculiarity of the road, being simply the *Indian trail*, which is formed by the Indian mode of travelling on foot, namely, *one after the other*, never side by side! This trail runs as an *artery* through the country, communicating with perhaps the polar regions. In the summer season this journey is made with the *canoe*, for by reason of the multitude of lakes lying at distances of a half to two or three miles asunder, we can make a *voyage* through the *interior* for two and three hundred miles after this fashion. The *canoe* is so *light*, being made of *birch-bark*, that one man can readily carry it (*inverted*) over his head. The bark answers well for a variety of purposes in Indian life. He covers his wigwam with it and makes his boxes and sometimes kettles, in which water may be boiled, and yet the bark is more inflammable than the pitch pine. The thin folds answer very well for writing upon with the lead pencil.
