
skilled in balancing ourselves. We had two trains, each drawn by a single horse. We met some dog-trains that had come from Prince Rupert's Land, where there are extensive missions of the English Church, amongst the Aborigines of those parts. The train only can be used, by reason of the peculiarity of the road, being simply the Indian trail, which is formed by the Indian mode of travelling on foot, namely, one after the other, never side by side! This trail runs as an artery through the country, communicating with perhaps the polar regions. In the summer season this journey is made with the canoe, for by reason of the multitude of lakes lying at distances of a half to two or three miles asunder, we can make a voyage through the interior for two and three hundred miles after this fashion. The canoe is so light, being made of birch-bark, that one man can readily carry it (inverted) over his head. The bark answers well for a variety of purposes in Indian life. He covers his wigam with it and makes his boxes and sometimes kettles, in which water may be boiled, and yet the bark is more inflam-mable than the pitch pine. The thin folds answer very well for writing upon with the lead pencil.
