SIR EDWARD CARSON.

Sir Edward Carson, K.C., has been appointed Lord Justice of Appeal in Ordinary to take the place of the late Lord Moulton. He was called to the Irish Bar in 1877, and entered the Middle Temple in 1893, taking silk in 1894. Though Sir Edward has been more prominent in the political arena of late years than at the Bar, it may safely be expected that he will make good on the Bench.
