GREAT PROGRESS IN HURON

THE BISHOP'S CHARGE.—The Bishop read his address to the Synod. It showed a large measure of prosperity, and the opiscopal acts, &c., of the year were summed up as follows:—Ist, ordained 7 doscons; 2nd, ordained 9 presbyters; 3rd, confirmed 1,776 persons, 4th, baptized 3 adults; 5th, consecrated 9 churches; 6th, consecrated 2 church-yards; 7th; opened 2 churches; 8th, proached 131 sermons; 9th, delivered 144 addresses; 10th, attended 49 incetings; 11th, administered the Holy Comnunion 34 times. It was stated that not fewer than fifty of the working clergy have received their theological training in Huron College; also that Dr. Alford, late lishop of China, accepts the position of commissary and canon of the cathedral without any charge upon the diocese. Twolve parishes formerly dependent upon Mission Fund aid have been corstituted Synodical Rectories.
