Canada Pension Plan

this pension plan would be to make one more try to see if the province of Quebec can be persuaded to come in. I should like to see an all-Canada plan, because I am a little mystified about what will happen in two or three years if one of the other provinces decides that the plan is not working too well, and wants to start its own. Does the province of Quebec have any more right than any other province to stay out? I suggest the answer is no, and that the willingness of other provinces to go along with the plan may change if the plan does not work properly. The best way, and the only safe way, is to get the kind of plan which receives the consent of all and is entered into by the Dominion of Canada, and the governments of all the provinces.

Resolution reported and concurred in.

Miss LaMarsh thereupon moved for leave to introduce Bill No. C-75, to establish a comprehensive program of old age pensions in Canada payable to contributors and survivors.

Motion agreed to and bill read the first time.
