HEARST SAYS DECISION DOES NOT APPLY HERE

Ontario Charters Necessary Until Constitutional Case is Settled by Privy Council.

Altho by a decision handed out by the privy council yesterday the John

This is the substance of a statement made by Premier Hearst last evening.

The premier in commenting on it stated that this was a matter of private litigation and that company law in British Columbia went much further than in Ontario. It might be that in such cases Ontario would be "intra vires" whereas British Columbia was "ultra vires." The decision on a fixed constitutional case now going to the privy council would set in motion legal difficulties for all the provinces.
