These can be killed immediately and sixty per cent of the ewes will again produce lambs in July. If only single lambs, and not twins, as frequently occurs, were produced, it is possible that one ewe might produce \$20 or \$25 worth of fur yearly, or \$40 to \$50 if twins came. That being the case, what price would breeders pay for Karakul rams of good quality?

Moreover, the Karakul sheep are much hardier than native breeds. This has been absolutely proved on ranges in the Panhandle of Texas where 60 per cent of Shropshires perished in a blizzard while not one Karakul succumbed. Personal observation by the directors during winter conditions on P. E. I. has confirmed them in the opinion of their great hardiness, compared with ordinary sheep. Their rustling qualities are the equal of goats.
