No Landing here Lower Canada.

NEWS FROM BUFFALO.

Threatened Raid by Water on
Port Colborne.

Fessenden goes to intercept the
Raider.

All Quiet at Prescott.

A Suspicious Vessel at
Goderich.

BUFFALO, June 5.
Every thing is quiet here at present. There are rumors of an intended raid on Port Colborne by a gun boat. Fessenden, of the United States navy, has gone up the lake to prevent this attempt if it should be made.

A writ of *ad hoc corpus* has been issued out on behalf of the Fenian officers.

The *Queen's Own* is now under judicial discussion in their regimental house.

PREScott, June 5.

All is quiet there.
TORONTO, June 5.
Telegrams from Lower Canada deny that any crossing had been made in that section.

Two telegrams from the west report a landing of Fenians at Bayfield. One places the numbers at 6,000 and the other says there is a large body. A subsequent telegram denies this rumor, and there is every reason to believe that it is not correct, or that if any have been landed the number is insignificant.

A despatch from Goderich reports the appearance of a suspicious looking vessel off that town.

Three hundred and sixty stand of arms with ammunition, have been served out to the Grand Trunk railway volunteer regiment.

The Queen's Own have been ordered to Stratford, and are already on the way.

Two men of the Uxbridge company of volunteers were injured near Newtonville by coming in a contact with a railway bridge. It is very necessary that great care should be exercised by the volunteers on the train. They should know that it is dangerous to get on the tops of trains and to stand on the platforms.

WATERTOWN, June 5, 11:45 A. M.
Large bodies of Fenians are constantly passing through here on their way north by every train. Destination not known. United States troops are coming and any attempt of the Fenians to cross will be stopped.
