LEAFS AGAIN WIN

Shaw Hits Home Run, Longest Ever Seen on Atlanta Grounds—Play To-day at Spartansburg.

ATLANTA, Ga., April 2.—Joe Kelley's band of willow wonders are yet to be beaten. They did the come back stuff to-day, again, and nosed out Hemphill's crickets by one run in another ten innings affair, the final count being 4 to 3 for McCaffrey's hired help. It was a much better battle than yesterday, and was a game worth watching from start to finish.
