We shall be glad to receive communications on any phase of this matter. The membership fee of the association has been fixed at 25 cents, but as it may be necessary to incur considerable expense before legislation is finally passed, we shall, of course, be glad to receive contributions of larger amounts. May we hope that you can see your way to intimating that any of your readers who so desire, may have their contributions acknowledged in your columns.
