WHY INSPECTOR INTERFERED

Caused a Bit of a Sensation in Disposal of Discharged Prisoner.

Chief Inspector Archibald stirred up some excitement in yesterday's police court, when he refused to allow an O'Reilly, discharged from custody, to be taken care of by Mrs. Higgins, superintendent of the Bellamy Home, where she had been employed. Mrs. Higgins complained to Chief Grassie and matters were straightened out. But the inspector defends his attitude by saying:

"I interfered because it is not my policy to allow cases to go to the Bellamy Home under its present management. Those taken there are done more harm than good."

"People have been allowed to see those we have sent there, and information has been given out which defeated our object in sending them there."

DEPUTIES LEAVE IN ANGER.

Claim That Language Provision is Violation of Treaty.

BUDAPEST, Hungary, July 4.—After a final protest against the provision in the government's railroad bill, requiring the exclusive use of the Hungarian language in the railroad service of Hungary, forty Croatian deputies to-day left the lower house of parliament in a body and used to further participate in its work.

The Croatians claim that the language provision is a violation of the Hungarian-Croatian compromise, and that they obstructed the measure for weeks, until finally the Hungarian government promulgated the bill by decree, causing a further embitterment of relations between Croatia and Hungary.
