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# RUSSIA SHOWS HER HAND IN DEMANDING MANCHURIA

Beijing, April 23.—Russia has demanded that China sign an agreement practically ending her sovereignty of Manchuria and excluding other nations from the country. The Russian Charge d'Affaires, M. Platonov, has informed Prince Ching, president of the Foreign Office, that the steps in the evaluation of Manchuria will be taken until this agreement is signed.

Yokohama, April 23.—Three Japanese warships have arrived at New Chwang, Manchuria. The Japanese government has demanded that the United States as well as Great Britain will support Japan. An agreement has been reached by which the political crisis has been averted, but the government's moral increment proposals remain unchanged.

# ONE EDUCATION BOARD FOR CITIES OF 150,000

In the legislature yesterday the Minister of Education introduced his bill to amalgamate Boards of Education. It is entitled "An Act Respecting Boards of Education in Certain Cities," and is framed primarily to provide for the amalgamation of the boards in the City of Toronto. It is stipulated that its provisions shall apply to cities of 150,000 and over. Mr. Harcourt explained that if the act works well it may be amended so as to apply to cities of less than 150,000.

# GRAIN DUTIES ABOLISHED IN ENGLAND'S PEACE BUDGET WITH SPLENDID SHOWING

Items of the Budget.

Estimated expenditure, 1903-4, £57,770,000. National debt charge, 135,000,000. Available for sinking fund, 31,500,000. Estimated revenue, 773,850,000. Available surplus, £1,000,000. Duties abolished on grain four per cent income tax.

London, April 23.—The budget, which was introduced in the House of Commons today, shows an estimated expenditure for 1903-04 of £57,770,000. The Chancellor of the Exchequer, Mr. Ritchie, fixed the national debt charge at £135,000,000, which is available for the sinking fund. The estimated revenue on the existing basis of taxation is £773,850,000, giving an available surplus of £1,000,000.

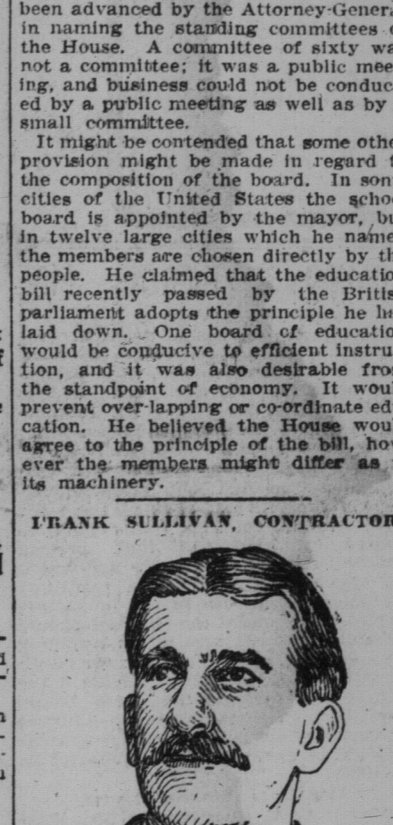
