Receipts of live stock at the City Market, as reported by the two railways, amounted to 105 loads since last Tuesday, composed

Experters.

Prices for exporters by the load ranged from \$5.40 to \$5.65 and one lot of 4 prime cuttie, 1500 lbs. each, were reported at \$5.75 per cwt.; export bulls sold at \$3.75 to \$4.25 per cwt., and cows at \$4.50 to \$4.75.

Butchers.

Choice picked lots of prime quality sold at \$5.25 to \$5.50; loads of good at \$5 to \$5.25 per cwt.; medium at \$4.50 to \$5 and cows at \$3.50 to \$4.25 per cwt.

There was a good demand for good short-keep feeders. And there was a large number of light exporters, amongst which were many cattle that were unfinished. These loads of light exporters, many of them were bought as short-keeps to go back to the country to be turned on grass. 


