PATRIOTIC FUND IN CITY NOW MOUNTS TO \$360,000 MARK

Subscriptions Today Total Over \$4,000 and Still Continue To Reach Committee---Auction Sale Wednesday Evening Brought In Large Sum.

Exceeded the \$350,000 mark, with the subscriptions amounting to over four thousand dollars which have come in this forenoon.

Though the canvass was brought to a formal close on Wednesday night, subscriptions still continue to flow into the treasury. At least a thousand dollars were taken in this forenoon by A. D. McLean, manager of the Bank of Commerce, 'honorary treasurer. Allan McLean, secretary of the men's committee, co-operating with the ladies' teams, reports \$2,000 added today to the total of the ladies' teams, bringing the amount turned in by them to more than \$30,000, their original objective. In one or two districts, in which it was impossible to complete the work in the time allotted, women canvassers have been busy today, making sure that no one has been overlooked. A substantial increase is still expected beyond the \$30,000.

Winnipeg, Feb. 22.—Charges of verpayments in connection with the work being done for the Manitoba Buildings by the J. McDiarmid Company, the present contractors, were nade before two audiences last hight by Octave S. Guilbault, a former employes of the contractors. Guilbault, who is to appear today ee of the Legislature, declared that if a proper inquiry were granted, and the documents produced he would expect to see all his charges

Guilbault declared that the Government was charged with larger quantities of coal than the amount used, and with a better quality of coal than that actually used, that the labor used on other contracts of the same contractor were charged against the Parliament Buildings, that the coal tonnage was padded, that material ordered for the Parliament Buildings was charged to the buildings, and then used by con-tractors on other work, and that the time of men on other work was charged against the buildings. PYJAMAS AND GOLD ON BERNSTORFF SHIP SEIZED BY CUSTOMS

One German Attache Had Hundreds of Suits.

Halifax, N. S., Feb. 22.—Examination of the baggage of the German party on board the Scandinavlan-American steamer Frederik VIII has revealed that each and every member of it has plentifully stocked himself or herself with goods which are scarce in the Fatherland to which they are sailing. The most favored line of goods among them, however, is cotton, and it was reported today that one secretary of the German embassy in Washington alone has several hundred suits of pyjamas. In view of the close association between cotton and explosives, it is thought that the custom officials here will relieve the Germans of some of their excess cotton goods, and make an allowance for them.

P'enty of Money.

The Germans, too, are all well supplied with money most of it in gold. This is also contraband, and it is understood here that it will be exchanged for them.

also contraband, and it is understood here that it will be exchanged for them into some form of currency less useful to the fatherland.

The rigidity with which the operations upon the Frederik VIII. have been conducted have not been relaxed as the time has passed. In addition to keeping a close watch upon the passengers and crew of the vessel, the guards placed over them are themselves under the surveillance of secret service men. One guard found this out when, after he had broken the rule forbidding him to converse with anybody conected with the ship, he was taken off his post, searched, and before being released, given a good lecture.

The Hugo Hamilton was on the way from Valparaiso with 4,000 tons of salt-petre consigned to the Swedish Farmers' Association, which was greatly needed on account of the scarcity of fertilizer in Sweden. She carried a crew of more than 30 men. Several days ago the Swedish government asked Berlin for particulars regarding the shelf.
