NEW MACHINE TO PUT CHLORINE IN MAINS

SARNIA, Feb. 9.—Included in the report of the fire and water committee at the last meeting of the city council, was a recommendation that the purchase of a new machine to diffuse liquid chlorine in the city water mains, in place of the hypochlorite or bleach in use for the past few years. The new system will be automatic, and provides a more uniform mixture, and requires less liquid chlorine than is used with the hypochlorite. It is now in vogue in many of the larger cities, including Vancouver and Winnipeg. Port Huron, Windsor and other smaller places have placed the order for the machine, and it is the intention of the city of Sarnia to purchase one of \$700, and the cost of operation is far less than the present method. It is expected that the new machine will be installed and in operation by the middle of March.

SUGGESTED CHANGES IN FLORENCE CIRCUIT
