

# Harvard-Yale Game Draws Thousands of Frenzied Fans

### Boston the Dazed Host of Throgs to Witness Annual Rugby Classic of Continent.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 21.—Deluged and dazed by the unexpected thousands descending upon the city for the morrow's Harvard-Yale football game, Boston is a dazed host tonight. Great throngs have gathered here for this gridiron classic in past years, but nothing approaching the present invasion has hitherto confronted the Massachusetts metropolis. Both Yale and Princeton have drawn huge assemblies of adherents and football followers in other seasons, but all previous records pale in comparison with the 1919 throng. Although the Harvard stadium will seat close to 50,000, the demand for tickets is far in excess of accommodations.

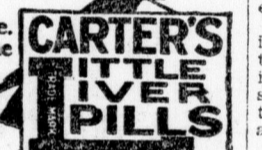

Poultry was the feature of a fairly large market in morning. Chickens and ducks were plentiful, but the demand was slow. Dressed loaves were sold by the quarter, ranging from 24 cents to 25 cents. Whole hogs sold for 22 cents. Pigs were plentiful, but firmer. The wholesale price was 70 cents. Beef they were selling at 75 cents, although some were asking higher. Dressed hams were offered in large numbers at 75 cents and \$1.00 a pair. Some were scarce and firm, selling chiefly at \$2.50 to \$2.50 a bag, although some poorer quality sold for less. 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# Steady Trade Expansion Shown by Annual Report of Bank of Montreal

### How Canada Is Coming Through Reconstruction Period—Big Gains Reported in the Savings of the Canadian People—Larger Business Being Handled Throughout Country.

Montreal, Nov. 21.—The advantages of the Canadian banking system have, during the past year, been more strikingly shown by the way Canadian banks quickly met the unprecedented situation arising out of the war and the manner in which they are now helping the country in the difficult period of reconstruction.

The annual statement of the Bank of Montreal for the fiscal year to October 31 is the first report to be issued for a full year since the armistice. On this account it contains many changes that indicate a gradual adjustment of special Government undertakings of the war period and a marked expansion in the general business of the country.

### Big Gain in Deposits

During the past few years there has evidently been a record increase in the number of depositors and business accounts in banks, and there are many indications that this growth will, within a short time, result in the total business of the banks even passing the large totals touched during the war period.

Among the outstanding features of the statement now going forward to Bank of Montreal shareholders is the increase in current loans and discounts in Canada, and the continued large increase in interest-bearing deposits. These would seem to indicate that the Canadian people are steadily adding to their savings. In the last six months of the year the gain in savings deposits amounted to approximately \$4,000,000.

An analysis of the general statement of assets and liabilities shows that the bank is in an excellent position to help the country through the period when the whole world has to meet so many unforeseen financial problems. With the adjustment of accounts following the war period, there is, of necessity, a decrease in total assets, as compared with a year ago, but a marked gain is reported, as compared with the first six months of the present fiscal year. Total assets now stand at \$345,941,809, compared with \$358,425,845 at the end of 1918. As usual, the bank has consistently maintained a very strong liquid position. Liquid assets amount to \$37,880,888, and are equal to 67.95 per cent of the liabilities to the public.

### Assistance to Government

In the liquid assets the principal accounts showing changes are Dominion Notes, which now stand at \$49,868,451, down from \$58,521,250 a year ago, and call and short loans in Great Britain and United States, which now amount to \$78,255,628, as against \$97,029,549 at the end of last year. At the same time there has been an increase in the holdings of Dominion and Provincial Government securities to \$63,884,250, as compared with \$46,570,556 a year ago, reflecting the assistance the bank has given the Government.

The expansion of trade and commerce in the country is indicated by an increase in the total of loans and discounts, amounting to \$164,382,551, up from \$146,028,861 at the end of last year.

Since the close of the last fiscal year the bank has also completed the absorption of the Bank of British North America, without inconvenience to the public and both Capital Stock and Accounts have been increased to \$20,000,000 respectively, as compared with \$16,000,000. The Profit and Loss Account, in turn, reflects the larger business handled, the total profits for the year amounting to \$5,314,227. The percentage earned on capital is 16.57 per cent.
