A very few good black cating cherries brought \$1.25 to \$2.25 per 11-quart basket, but some went as low as 50c; the good 6's going at 90c to \$1; good sour cherries selling at 75c to 90c per 11 quarts and 40c to 45c per 6 quarts; some 6 quarts going as low as 25c.
