Peaches were again shipped in heavily yesterday, and brought about the same prices as on Thursday, but were a slower sale, very few going at the highest prices. Six-quart flats sold at 15c to 25c, six-quart lenos at 20c to 35c, 11-quart flats at 20c to 50c, and 11-quart lenos at 25c to 75c, a very few of extra choice quality bringing 80c and 85c, the bulk of the 11-quart lenos selling around 50c to 65c. Plums were shipped lightly, and choice ones were a good sale at firm prices, the six-quart leno baskets selling at 40c, while poor quality plums in 11-quart flats sold as low as 20c, better quality bringing 35c to 50c, while good quality sold at 60c to 75c, and choice lots brought as high as \$1.

Cantaloupes continue to come in in smailer quantities, and remain about stationary in price, 11-quarts selling at 50c to 75c, and 16-quarts at 75c to \$1.
Grapes were not shipped very heavily yesterday, but remained unchanged in price.

Dried onlons continue to bring high prices, the 11-quart baskets of choise quality bringing 60c and 65c.

Corn continues to vary greatly in quality and price, selling at 10c to 25c, and some extra choice at 30c per dozen.
