LONDON, July 31—Egyptologists claim that they have discovered that Rameses II is a fraud, and that he is not entitled to the appelation of "Great" which historians have given him. Recent explorations, it is said, have developed the fact that the many temples and monuments bearing his name, and therefore supposedly his work, existed a thousand years before him. The explorers believe the king was vain and caused his name to be cut everywhere. Prof. Naville, one of the official explorers of antiquities in Egypt has this to say about Rameses. The more we discover about Rameses the more convinced we are that he was a fraud. He was not great in any way, but his vanity convinced we are that he was a fraud. To satisfy this he conceived the notion of causing his name to be inscribed on every statue and monument that he thought would stand the test of time. The plan succeeded for many years.
