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REV MR BONNELL WILL REMAIN AS PASTOR OF KIRK

Declines Call To Regina—Resolution Presented To Minister

Rev. J. S. Bonnell, who had received a call from Knox church, Regina, last evening announced his intention to remain in St. Andrew's Kirk, and the congregation announced they would provide an assistant during the winter months. At a large congregational meeting a resolution adding Mr. Bonnell to remain was unanimously adopted and a committee, composed of A. S. Allan, G. S. Bishop and J. J. Murray, appointed to present it to Mr. Bonnell.

The resolution was as follows: Mr. Allan, as chairman, read the resolution which was to the effect that the congregation asked Mr. Bonnell to remain for four reasons:

"First, that the present relations between pastor and people have existed for the short period of less than three years and the work so successfully begun would be seriously affected without the guiding hand of the present minister."

"Second, that the wonderful gathering of young men into the church and its activities would be greatly retarded and as the young are the strength and hope of the church the congregation trusted that the minister would seriously consider this aspect of his work."

"Third, the wonderful success of his public ministrations as evidenced by very large congregations and in gathering of souls to the Master's kingdom."

"Fourth, the peace and harmony which reigned in the church and the splendid organization in every department and the blessing of the Master on the minister's leadership."

A resolution was passed recording the appreciation of the services of Mr. Bonnell and the manner in which she had endeavored herself to the church and congregation.

When the committee waited on Mr. Bonnell he said that earlier in the day he decided not to leave and had so notified the Regina congregation. He expressed his appreciation of the sentiments contained in the resolution and of the offer of assistance in the winter months.
