SOLEMN SERVICE AT 40 HOURS CLOSING

Many Attend Impressive Ceremony in St. John the Baptist Church

The solemn closing of the Devotion of the Forty Hours in St. John the Baptist church last evening was attended by a very large congregation. The service opened with recitation of the Rosary, led by Rev. Francis Cronin of Holy Trinity Church. An eloquent sermon on the Blessed Sacrament, was delivered by Rev. Francis Gillen of the Cathedral. After the chanting of the Litany of the Saints, in which Rev. J. J. McDermott, pastor, led, a very impressive procession wound its way through the church. It was led by 100 school girls dressed in white, with white veils and floral wreaths. Twelve of the smaller girls strewed flowers. There were also 50 altar boys and ten attending priests, lastly His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc bearing the Blessed Sacrament and attended by Rev. C. P. Carleton of Silver Falls, as deacon, and Rev. Wilfred Malette of Fairville, as subdeacon. The canopy was borne by four members of the Holy Name Society—Ernest Wallace, Jon Kennedy, Daniel Owens and William Ward.

The service closed with Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament. Rev. A. V. Kinnella, curate of St. John the Baptist church, was master of ceremonies. Other priests in the sanctuary were Rev. J. J. Ryan of the Church of the Assumption; Rev. F. F. Walker of East Saint John, and Rev. William Crowley of St. Andrews.

The whole service was deeply impressive. The children were well trained for the procession under the efficient direction of Miss Ada Baxter, assisted by Miss Genevieve Stevens and Miss Alice Power. During the Forty Hours 1200 received Holy Communion.

WANTS RESTRICTION ON WEAPONS' SALE

Bill Introduced By Senator Belcourt Given Second Reading in Commons

OTTAWA, Ont., May 12.—Senator Belcourt introduced a bill in the Senate yesterday to amend the criminal codes respecting the possession of weapons. He pointed out that the crime wave was due, in a great measure, to the freedom with which revolvers could be obtained. There was an almost universal demand for restrictive measures dealing with the possession of firearms.

He proposed to amend the criminal code to prohibit the importation, manufacture and sale of revolvers and similar weapons, except under government authorization. The bill received its second reading, and was referred to committee.
