
*SOLEMN SERVICE AT 40 HOURS CLOSING

"Impersonating Francis" Well Record Egg Bill Introduced By Senator Belcourt Given Second Reading

> OTTAWA, Ont., May 12-Senator Belcourt introduced a bill in the Senate vesterday to amend the criminal codes respecting the possession of weapons. He pointed out that the crime wave was due, in a great measure, to the freedom with which revolvers could be obtained. There was an almost universal demand for restrictive measures dealing with the session of firearms.

He proposed to amend the criminal code to prohibit the importation, manufacture and sale of revolvers and similar weapons, except under govern-ment authorization. The bill received its second reading, and was referred


