SMYRNA, July 14—Smyrna quay, to which thousands fied to escape the wholesale tragedy of the burning of the city four years ago, will witness another tragic scene today. Fifteen persons were condemned to death yesterday for plotting to kill Mustapha Kemal Pasha, President of Turkey, a month ago, on his arrival at Smyrna and today thirteen of them will be hanged at duly separated points of the waterfront. Two were condemned by default.

The superstitious say that thirteen death sentences on the thirteenth day of the month boded ill for the future of new Turkey; nevertheless the verdict of the tribunal was applauded.


