C. P. R. SUBURBAN SERVICE.

The Canadian Pacific Railway announce a number of alterations in Suburban service, briefly outlined as follows:

The departures. Suburban will leave at 9:15 a.m. for Welsford, and this train will be cancelled after September 15th.

Non Suburban leaving 1:15 p.m. will run on Saturday only, and will continue during September and October.

There will be no change in express leaving at 5:15 p.m.

Suburban will leave at 6:15 p.m., but will not run on Saturdays September 15th, 22nd and 29th.

Night Suburban leaving at 10:20 p.m. will run on Saturdays only September 15th, 22nd and 29th.

The arrivals. The early morning Suburban from Welsford will arrive at 7:45 a.m., and the Fredericton local will come in at 8:45 a.m.

The noon Suburban from Welsford will arrive at 11:50 a.m., and will be cancelled after September 15th.

The afternoon Suburban from Welsford arriving at 4:25 p.m. will be cancelled after September 8th.

The night Suburban will arrive at 9:05 p.m., but will not run on Saturdays only in September and October.

After September 16th the St. John-McAdam express going and returning will stop, when required, at Ketepec and Ononette, in addition to regular scheduled stops.

French Girl Invades Ireland As "Human Question Mark"

(By Milton Brunner.) London.—The best picture of the tragic events of the past two years in Ireland and of the men who played the star parts, has not been painted by any Irishman, nor Briton, nor American, but by a little, slender, 20-year-old French girl—Mademoiselle Simone Terry.

Daughter of the well-known editor of a liberal Parisian newspaper and herself an expert reporter, she was for months a conspicuous figure in the melancholy streets of the Irish capital. If I saw a crowd gathered around a review of Free State troops and hastened to see the show, Mademoiselle Simone was sure to be there ahead of me.

If I had an appointment with a cabinet minister and had to wait past the hour, I was sure to find out that French girl was the cause of it. She was the human question mark, she was ever present, this bright-eyed miss who felt herself so much at home in Ireland. And the result of all this is embodied in the little book, "En Irlande," just published in Paris.

Mademoiselle Terry deftly plucks the halo from the brow of DeValera. Just as artistically she glides the laurels on the brows of Arthur Griffith and Michael Collins, the great heroes of the closing phases of the fight for Irish freedom. And she fills her book with interesting anecdotes, with pathetic little facts, with vivid pen pictures.

For instance, how much she reveals when she tells us that poor Griffith, when he died so suddenly, had only one penny in his pocket—two cents. It was typical of the glorious poverty of the man who gave his whole life to Ireland.

In her writing this French girl has all the realism that is characteristic of her countrymen. She tells us volumes when she quotes De Valera as saying: "The country is there for the taking—take it!"

And Michael Collins replying: "The nation is there for the making—make it!"

One could go on quoting plums from the little blue-covered volume. But the best can merely be told about.

Kevin O'Higgins, minister of the interior, is sitting in his office being interviewed by Mademoiselle Simone. He expects to be asked all kinds of questions about the condition of the country. And this French girl reporter, opening her brown eyes wide innocently purrs at him in her French-English:

"Mr. Minister, is there any danger of your making yourself dictator of storm-tossed Ireland?"

It's no wonder she wrote a rich book. No more male reporter would have asked similar questions—and lived.

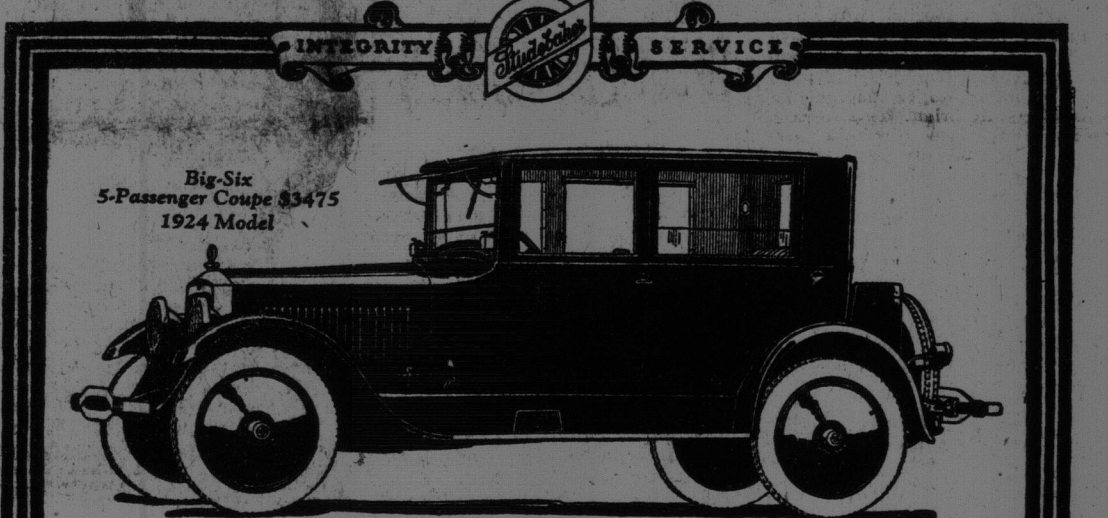

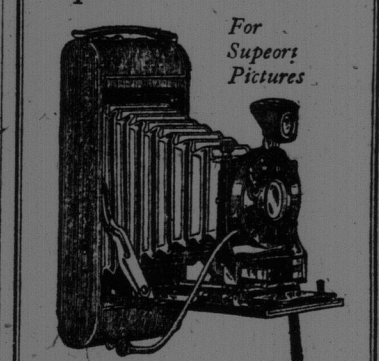
