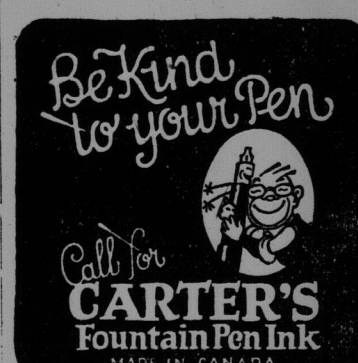
"MYSTERIOUS BOY" IDENTIFIED AT TEA
