## FIRE ON PARENTS WHEN IN DREAM

Danbury, Conn., March 11.—Engaged in an imaginary battle while apparently in a dream, Franklin M. Komp, 13, son of Frank S. Komp, shot his father and mother in their home at midnight, and otherwise injured them during a struggle that followed.

The elder Komp is in the hospital with a bullet wound in the shoulder, another in the hip, and lacerations caused by blows and bites. Mrs. Komp, at her home, has two wounds on the head, one apparently caused by a bullet. The son, charged with assault with intent to kill, is held in \$2,000 bail.

The Komp family moved here from Brooklyn, N. Y., a few months ago. Mr. Komp is the head of the Langdon Company, electrical goods manufacturers.

When Mr. and Mrs. Komp retired last night their son was at table reading a Sunday school paper. Two hours later they were awakened by pistol shots in their room and found the boy with a revolver in each hand, firing at random.

A struggle ensued, in which the family, barbed with in nightclothes, went out of the house and into the deep snow. Mrs. Komp wrestled one of the revolvers from her son and struck him upon the head with it. At the fourth blow young Komp ceased the struggle, rubbed his eyes and looked in evident amazement at his surroundings and the revolver in his hand. He remembered nothing that had happened, he said, but in a dream he had had a struggle with a party of men who had entered the house.

## HEAVY SALES OF THE CHAIN STORES

Record Breaking Business and Large Net Profits Were Enjoyed by These Establishments During the Year 1919.

Boston, March 11.—The year 1919 covered a period of record-breaking sales and large net profits for the so-called chain store group of companies. While the annual reports of a majority of that group have yet to be issued for last year, the financial results of the Woolworth Company in 1919 give a pretty close idea of the profits that the Kresge Company, McCrory, Penney, and the Kress Company have made up last year.

The Woolworth Company in 1919 operated at a profit of 8.47 cents on each dollar of sales compared with only 6.65 cents in 1918. The Kresge Company, the closest competitor of Woolworth, presumably showed a substantial increase in its margin of profit last year, likewise the other chain stores.

It is of interest to note that the record volume of sales handled by the Woolworth Company last year was equivalent to a weekly average of \$2,298,000, while sales of the Kresge Company averaged \$820,000 a week. The Kresge Company, which operates a large number of chain stores throughout the country, handled sales averaging \$485,000 a week last year.

The six prominent companies comprising the so-called chain store group of companies last year reported total sales of \$244,192,489, compared with \$209,156,187 in 1918, an increase of \$35,036,302, or 17 per cent. The Penney Company last year showed the largest per cent. increase in sales, and the Woolworth Company the smallest, sales of the former gaining \$7,455,000, or 35 per cent. while sales of the latter increased \$1,816,000, or 11 per cent. The Kresge Company increased its sales by \$6,326,000, or 17 per cent. last year.

## ULSTER AND THE HOME RULE BILL

Unionist Council Decision as to Six Counties

For Control by Ulster Parliament — Unionists Win, if Lloyd George Bill Adopted, Says Sir Edward Carson.

Belfast, March 11.—The Ulster Unionist Council decided yesterday in favor of the six Ulster counties being controlled by an Ulster parliament, should the new home rule bill be enacted. The council declined to accept any responsibility in regard to the bill, and it is understood will make no attempt to defeat it.

Dublin, March 11.—At a meeting of the Irish Unionist Alliance yesterday, a resolution was passed reaffirming the determination of the southern Unionists to oppose home rule by every means in their power.

Belfast, Ireland, March 11.—Sir Edward Carson during a speech yesterday said that if the present home rule bill passed, Ulster would be lucky, he added, in getting without fighting what they had coveted to fight for. If the bill had included the whole of Ulster, said Sir Edward, they would have had to oppose it tooth and nail; then if it were rejected, the 1914 change made in plan. Don't hesitate. The address was made at a meeting of the Ulster Unionist Council, attended by delegates from all parts of the province. Sir Edward Carson presided.

Lord Farnham offered a resolution to the effect that the council would abide by the covenant and refuse to accept any form of government which did not include the whole of Ulster. It called on the parliamentary leaders to take steps to secure its inclusion in the present home rule bill. The resolution was defeated.

Lord Wallace then offered a resolution, which was adopted, reaffirming faith in the legislative union of Ireland and Great Britain, adding:

"Inasmuch as the new bill is based on the principles of home rule and would place us on an equal citizenship in the parliament of the United Kingdom, this council cannot recommend that any parliamentary representative of Ulster accept any responsibility for it. But inasmuch as the bill is substituting the government of Ireland act of 1914, and it recognizes the right of the six counties of Ulster to separate from Ireland, for which Ulster tenaciously has striven, and offers a preferable alternative to the act of 1914, and inasmuch as there is no prospect of procuring a simple repeal of that act, this council is of the opinion that the Ulster representatives should not assume responsibility for attempting to defeat the bill, but should press for such amendments as are necessary and desirable in the interests of Ulster throughout the country, and should immediately after eating a resolution was unanimously adopted affirming the belief that the business interests of Ireland would best

"But," the resolution continued, "recognizing the grave risk that rejection of the present bill would lead to an all Ireland parliament in which the vast commercial interests of the northern provinces would be gravely imperilled—and, inasmuch as the proposed bill contained in the government of Ireland 1920 bill reserve to the imperial parliament complete control of taxation levied through customs and excise, and, to some extent, through inland revenue, it is authorized that Sir Edward Carson take such steps as he considers right and proper to secure a settlement which will permit Ulster to proceed on her course of peace and prosperity."

## MUST REMOVE TARIFF WALLS

Sir George Paish Declares  
Empire Must Admit American Goods on Same Terms as Our Own.

London, March 11.—Sir George Paish, speaking before the National Liberal Club last night on the national financial position, said:
