## Sunny South Calls Baseball Players

New York, March 19—The baseball  
season of 1919 has been taken out of  
the campfire and moth balls and this  
week will be sent south for a little air-  
ing. The season is under way for the  
Cleveland Indians under Lee Fohl, and  
the Browns, under Jimmy Burke, are on  
their way south, while the three New  
York clubs, the Giants, Yankees, and  
Dodgers, are packing their grips to be  
ready to start this week. On Thurs-  
day the advance guard of the Giants,  
under Manager McGraw, will start for  
Gainesville, Fla., and on the same day  
the Brooklyn club, under Manager Rob-  
inson, will go to Jacksonville by boat.

The Yankees will go to Jacksonville  
on Saturday. By next week all three  
local baseball outfits will be taking the  
kinks out of their sleepy joints under  
the warm Florida sun. During the next  
two weeks the Southland will fairly  
blossom with promising young recruits  
who will threaten to push the Ty Cobbs,  
the Walter Johnsons, and Hal Chases  
into the background.
