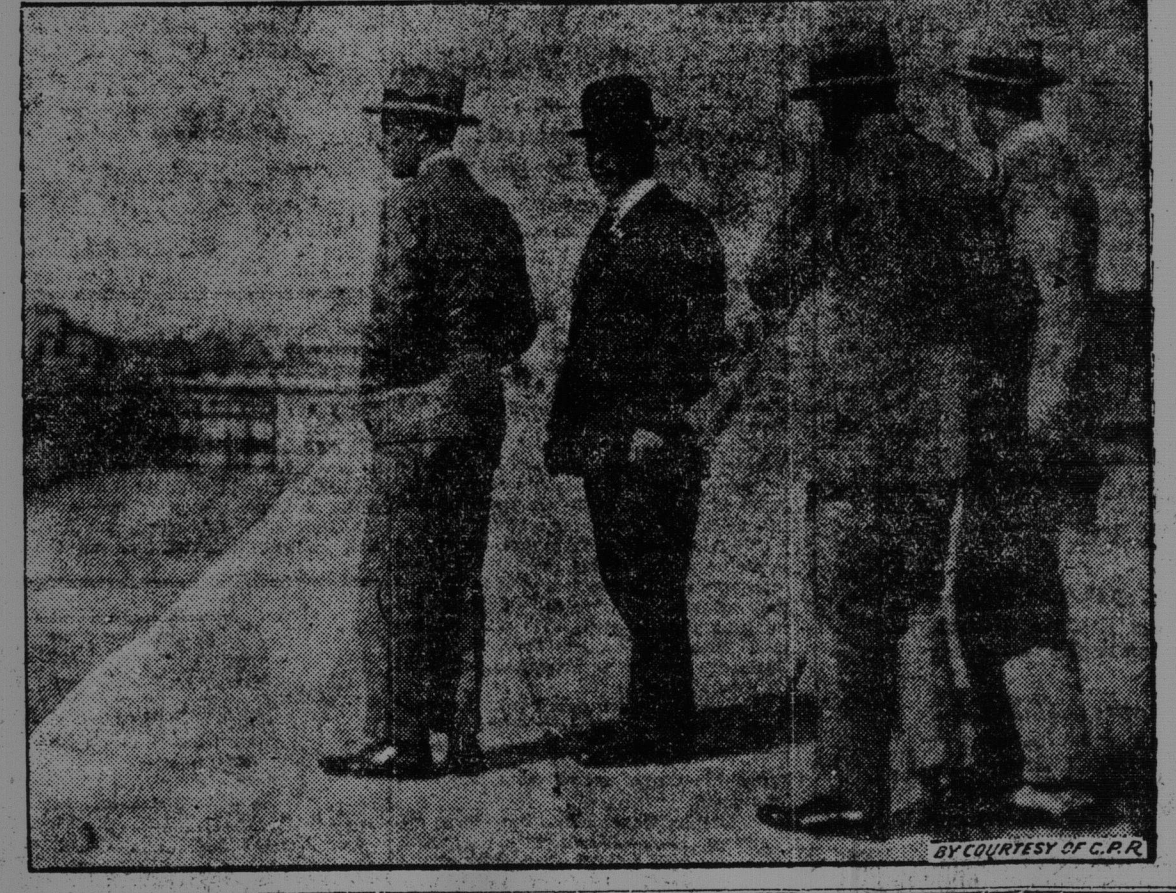

CRAVATH AND COBB LEADERS

Baseball Averages in the Two Major Leagues
Detroit Star After Honors as Base Stealer as Well as Batsman—Ruth Leads as Run Maker
Chicago, Sept. 13.—Cravath of Philadelphia dropped four points during the last week, but continues to top the batters in the National League who have participated in fifty or more games, according to averages released today. His average is .336, which is twelve points better than Thorpe of Boston, the runner-up. Cravath's eleven homers continue to be high in this department, with Knut of New York the runner-up with ten. Rousche of Cincinnati has passed the double century mark in total bases and leads with a figure of 205. Catfish of Pittsburgh added three stolen bases to his string and is showing the way on the paths with thirty-four. Groh of Cincinnati is out in front as leading run-maker, having registered seventy-seven times. Burns of New York is the runner-up with seventy-six. Other leading National League batters include Meusel of Philadelphia, .312; Groh, Cincinnati, .311; and Barber of Chicago, .309.

NEW HAMPSHIRE HAS NOW RATIFIED WOMAN SUFFRAGE
Washington, Sept. 13.—With the ratification of the Federal Woman Suffrage amendment today, sixteen states have ratified the amendment and leaders in the suffrage movement tonight expressed confidence that the amendment will be a valid part of the American Constitution in time to permit women to vote in the presidential election of 1920. The states that have so far ratified are: Wisconsin, Michigan, Kansas, Ohio, New York, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Texas, Iowa, Missouri, Arkansas, Montana, Nebraska, Minnesota, and New Hampshire. The Utah legislature will hold a special session on September 29 to ratify. This will make seventeen ratifications. Suffrage leaders pointed out tonight that legislatures will meet in January in Maryland, Rhode Island, New Jersey, and Kentucky, and said they expect to obtain ratifications of the amendment in all these states. They also asserted that they have assurances from the governors of fifteen other states that special sessions will be called in those states, if necessary, to bring about ratification in time for women to vote in the 1920 election.

trotsk munition works, and after hours of waiting the workmen began to say: "Wait a moment. The White will be here, and they will show you how to do things in an orderly way."

"The Soviet leaders do not pay much attention to the opinions of non-Russian labor leaders, least of all to British opinion. In fact, England is rarely mentioned, except to be blamed for anything and everything that is wrong. Thus I heard of one case where a quite obscure and entirely insignificant little person who was a Soviet member tried to get elected to the executive committee of the trade Soviet, but was unsuccessful.
